Executive Summary and SWOC Analysis

Introduction

The SNDT Arts and Commerce College for Women, Pune is a constituent College of the SNDT Women's University, Mumbai. The vision of the great social reformer, Bharatratna Maharshi Dhondo Keshav Karve, was translated into reality by the foundation of a women's University named as Indian Women's University, with its first college at Pune in 1916. With a generous support from Sir Vitthaldas Thackersey, an industrialist with social orientation, Indian Women's University was named as Shreemati Nathibai Damodar Thackersey (SNDT) Women's University in the year 1920. The head office of the University was shifted to Mumbai in 1936.

In 1951, the University acquired statutory recognition from the Government of Maharashtra along with the rare privilege of jurisdiction across the country. Today, the University has four campuses at Pune, Churchgate (Mumbai), Juhu (Mumbai), and Shriwardhan (Konkan). It has thirteen constituent colleges and one hundred and seventy four affiliated colleges in the states of Maharashtra, Gujarat, Goa, Madhya Pradesh, and Uttar Pradesh. The University founded with one programme offered to five students has grown to two hundred programmes offered through twelve faculties to more than seventy thousand students. We are proud to mention that the seed of this *Bodhi-tree* was sown in this College.

The mission statement of the University and the College is "Sanskrita Stree Parashakti" which means "An Enlightened Woman is a Source of Infinite Strength". 'Empowerment of Women through Higher Education' is the main objective of the College.

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

The College offers the following Undergraduate programmes:

- Bachelor of Arts
- Bachelor of Commerce
- Bachelor of Visual Arts
- Bachelor of Computer Applications

The SNDT Women's University is the ultimate body to design the curricula for different programmes. The objectives and the mission of the University are reflected in the syllabi of the programmes. The curriculum designed by the University is followed by the College. However, many of our faculty members participate in the designing of the curricula as members of Boards of Studies. The staff members also participate in the content analysis workshops and



proactively give suggestions for modifying the syllabi from time to time. The College has also organized content analysis workshops in some subjects.

The vision and the mission statements of the College duly consider the interests as well as the careers of our students. The academic programmes have the components of information communication and study of the recent trends in the selected areas of knowledge. The College has developed a feedback system to ensure the quality of teaching. The curriculum aspect is kept learner-centric.

Criterion II: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

The student-centric teaching, learning, and evaluation processes are the core values of this Institution. The College takes efforts to translate the objectives of the curricula into reality through proper planning, implementing, monitoring, and evaluating the teaching and learning process. Many innovative methods are introduced to make teaching-learning more effective and interesting. The presentations, group discussions, study tours and study visits, workshops, simulations and role plays, Geo Fest, Computer Fest, and self-learning with the help of ICT, etc., are the teaching methods used regularly in the College.

The College has well qualified and enthusiastic faculty members who take pains to improve the academic performance of the students. For the overall personality development and to build competence amongst the students, various curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are organized by the College. The College also motivates students to participate in intercollegiate, University, State, and National level events and competitions.

The College, being a women's college, admits the students, whose parents do not prefer co-education institutions on account of social, cultural, and economic taboos. The girls coming from the low-income strata as well as the married women get opportunity to pursue their education through this College. By considering the need of the entrants, who are in many cases the first generation learners, the College provides a homely, encouraging and motivating atmosphere for the students.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

Research provides the way out for developing creative and scientific attitude amongst the students. The College undertakes departmental and interdisciplinary research projects to create awareness about the social issues.



This also helps to teach the methodology of collection of data, analysis and interpretation of data.

The teaching staff is involved in research activities through participation in seminars and conferences, presenting and publishing research articles in conference proceedings as well as in research journals, undertaking minor, major and Ph. D. research studies and also by giving guidance to M. Phil. and Ph. D. students as recognized guides of the SNDT Women's University, and other universities.

The teaching staff provides consultancy services to society. The psychological and career guidance is provided to the needy students from the College through the counseling cell. As a social service, consultancy for psychological and career guidance is also given to outside students. Consultancy for analysis of data collected for research is provided through collaborations with Asian Development Bank and CBRTI, Pune.

The N.S.S., N.C.C. and the other Departments actively participate in extension activities. Women Empowerment, Save Environment, Save Girl Child, Cancer Awareness, Nutrition and Health Awareness are the themes chosen by the College. Street plays, street rallies, poster exhibitions, workshops, tree plantation programmes, surveys, and annual special camps are the activities organized to reach to the society. These activities are also helpful to create awareness about the social issues amongst the students and to enhance their own creativity and competence.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College is a constituent College of the SNDT Women's University. The College has a specious eco-friendly campus of twenty-two acres. It has a heritage building completed in 1923. It has forty-six classrooms, which are utilized in two shifts. The College has two well-equipped computer laboratories with internet access for students and staff. Geography and Psychology laboratories are provided for practical courses. Music, and Drawing and Painting students also get well-equipped classrooms for their practice. The College has a seminar hall with sound system and LCD projector. A Ladies' Room is available to students for recreation and relaxation.

The Pune Campus of the University has a Central Library, rich with text books, reference books, and journals. The Library also provides access to e-books, e-journals to the staff and students. A safe and secured hostel facility is available for the students along with the mess, canteen, recreation room, medical aid, and homely atmosphere. Two sports grounds attract the students



to become true sportswomen. Special coaching is given for Basketball, Volleyball, and Throw ball, Kho-kho, Kabaddi, Badminton, Taekwondo, and Boxing. The University has provided ten road cycles that can be used by our students. Development of the Gymnasium and a Yoga Centre are in process.

Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

The College supports the students in various ways. Many of the students come from lower income strata and they are first generation learners. The students require support in academics, guidance for future career, employment opportunities, and also a desire to enhance their personality to become dependable and capable citizens. The College provides this support to them through regular curricular and extra-curricular activities. It takes care of the differently able students through micro and remedial teaching. Bridge courses are offered to fill in the gap between students' present knowledge base and the required skill level. The advanced learners get food for thought by participating in Study Circle. Enrichment Programmes, Personality Development Workshops, Career Guidance Workshops, Course on Computer for All, N.S.S., N.C.C., Sports, and Cultural Activities cater for the necessary merits required to become a responsible person.

The graduate students can avail themselves of the facility of post graduation studies in the Post Graduate Departments of the SNDT Women's University, Pune Campus. The Placement Cell tries to promote employability skills amongst the students through training programmes. These programmes are organized with the help of recruitment cells of different companies like TCS, e-Clerk, Wipro, etc. The Placement Cell also conducts coaching for competitive examinations, organize mock-interviews, group discussions, etc. The notifications regarding recruitment opportunities are displayed on students' notice boards.

The needy and deserving students are allowed to pay fees in installments. These students are also informed of scholarships, free-ships, or any other special facilities offered by the Central and State Governments. The College has formed students' welfare fund with the help of donations received. This fund is also used for financial assistance.

Criterion VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

The College is a constituent College of the SNDT Women's University. It runs undergraduate programmes on grant-in-aid as well as self sufficiency basis. Principal, the administrative head of the Institution, and the Vice Principal share responsibilities related to the students. IQAC takes care of the



maintenance and enhancement of quality in teaching, learning, evaluation, research, the co- curricular, the extra-curricular, and extension activities. The Departmental issues are handled by the Head of the Department.

The committees are also formed for specific purposes such as the Planning Committee, Budget Committee, Purchase Committee, Research Committee, Examination Committee, Career Guidance and Placement Cell, Magazine Committee, Cultural and Students' Welfare Committee, Enrichment Programmes Committee, Staff and Students' Redressal Cell, Anti-Ragging Committee, RTI Committee, N.S.S. Advisory Committee, etc.

The office has a senior clerk and a junior accountant and the other clerical and class IV staff to handle day-to-day functioning of the College. Automation of office procedures has been initiated to improve efficiency of work.

The mission 'Sanskrita Stree Parashakti' and the objective of 'Quality in Every Activity' are attained through thoughtful planning, proper implementation, and meticulous monitoring.

Criterion VII: Innovations and Best Practices

The College promotes the use of innovative practices in teaching, learning, evaluation process and the day-to-day administrative functioning for raising the quality and efficiency. To inculcate such values as gender equality and environment protection, a gender audit, and green audit are pursued. Many best practices such as Jigar- adventure sports club, exhibitions of alumni and regular students, workshops on personality development, health awareness programmes, inter-collegiate elocution competitions, interdisciplinary survey based research projects in women's issues, Geo-Fest, Computer Fest, etc., are organized.

The objectives of these best practices are to make our students globally competent, to build confidence, entrepreneurship and creativity amongst them, to empower them with health and skills, to create awareness about the social issues and to inculcate good morals and values for being good citizens of the nation.



SWOC Analysis of the Institution:

Strengths

- The College has an eco-friendly campus with about 100 years of history. Twenty-two acres of land in the heart of the city is a gift of visionary Maharshi Karve. Infrastructure with ample space, hostel facility, University branch library, play grounds, canteen are the central facilities provided by the University.
- The curriculum is provided by the University. The senior faculty members contribute in designing of curriculum as Members of Boards of Study. They also participate in Content Analysis workshops.
- To achieve the mission and objectives of the University and to support the students to face the dynamic contemporary issues, foundation and enrichment courses are specially designed by the University. Status of Women, Personality Development, Current Concerns, and Environmental Studies are the courses offered to the students.
- Bachelor Degrees in Fine Arts is the unique feature of our College. We offer three-year B. A. Music programme and four year Bachelor of Visual Arts (BVA) programme.
- Well-qualified teaching staff is the strength of our College. Out of twenty three permanent staff members, eleven are Ph. D.s and all have done their orientation programme and refresher courses as per UGC norms. Eight staff members have cleared NET/SET examination.
- To make the teaching learning interesting and effective, innovative teaching methods like study tours, field visits, on-job training, use of ICT in teaching and learning, projects, preparation of models, exhibitions, surveys, simulation, role play, etc., are used by different departments.
- Even though ours is an undergraduate college, six staff members are research guides. Thirty-six students are registered under them for Ph. D. and thirty-one students have enrolled for M. Phil. in last five years.
- The teachers participate in State/National/International conferences or seminars as paper presenters or resource persons. In all sixty nine papers were presented at different seminars during the last five years.
- Faculty members write and publish research articles in Peer Reviewed Journals. In all twenty six research papers are published during the last five years.



- Staff members have contributed in publication of seventeen books with ISBN either as sole author or as co-author, and four books without ISBN.
- Two teachers of the College provide consultancy in carrying out research and analysis of the data to the organizations such as Asian Development Bank and Central Bee Research and Training Institution and generates income for the College.
- Well established NSS, NCC, Sports, Adventure Sports, and Cultural activities are regularly carried out in the College. Participation in such activities nurtures the personality of the students.
- We have cordial and friendly relationship with alumni. Registration
 of alumni association and parents-teachers association has been
 initiated by the College.
- Through placement and career guidance cell training sessions for development of employability skills are organized. Companies like Wipro and TCS conduct written tests and interviews in the College.
- Automation of office procedure has raised efficiency and transparency in day-to-day working of the College. On-line admission procedure, on-line registration for examinations, on-line question papers for The University examinations, computerized accounting system, etc., are undertaken by the College.
- Transparent admission process, effective monitoring of teachinglearning and evaluation systems, timely feedback from stakeholders, and the support from the University help in smooth functioning of the College.
- As a practice, the College organizes different programmes and activities for the students. Consistency in organization helps quality enhancement. New ideas and themes are introduced from time to time. Experience in organization leads to refinement in the activity.
- Best practices like Geo fest, Computer Fest, Interdisciplinary surveys, etc., add to the subject knowledge of our students. To cater the need of today, activity like Computer for All is helpful.
- Organization of exhibition-cum-sale for alumni and regular students and the activities of Placement cell give direction to students for enhancing employability and entrepreneurship skills.

Weaknesses

• The College has failed to organize National, International workshops, seminars, conferences.



- Being an UG College, there are limitations in students' participation in research activities. Less research projects through funding agencies are undertaken. So far there are no linkages and collaborations for research.
- There is less support to the students for competitive examinations.
- Well equipped conference hall with more capacity is needed.
- Wi-fi connectivity is not available in the College.
- No academic and administrative audit has been undertaken so far.

Opportunities

- New vocational courses will be started.
- Computer based short courses of MS Office, Tally, DTP, Photoshop, Coral Draw, and Web-designing will be started during long vacations.
- Short courses of Shorthand, Typing, and Spoken English will be run during working days.
- Centre for guidance for competitive and entrance examinations will be started.
- National and International seminars, and conferences will be arranged by the College.
- More number of Departmental Research Projects will be undertaken.
- Collaborations can be made with NGOs, banks, established interior designers, artists and industrial forums.

Challenges:

- Overall demand for Arts faculty is reducing.
- Due to privatization of Higher Education, there is more number of private colleges leading to more competition. Corporate sector is coming forward to set up their educational institutions.
- There is a gap between expected job oriented skills and theoretical knowledge provided by conventional courses and programs.





Introduction

The SNDT Arts and Commerce College for women is a Constituent College of the SNDT Women's University, which is the ultimate body to design the curriculum. The curriculum designed by the University is followed by the College. However, many of our faculty members have participated in curriculum designing as Members of Boards of study as well as by participating in content analysis workshops and have made suggestions proactively for modifying the syllabi from time to time. The College has organized content analysis workshops in some subjects.

Under graduate programs offered by the College are:

- Bachelor of Arts
- Bachelor of Commerce
- Bachelor of Computer Applications
- Bachelor of Visual Arts

The vision and the mission statements of the College duly consider the interests as well as the careers of our students. The academic programmmes have the components of information communication and study of the recent trends in the selected areas of knowledge. The College has developed a feedback system to ensure quality of teaching. The curriculum aspect is kept learner-centric.


The institution develops and deploys action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum through following measures:

- For continuous evaluation, internal tests are conducted by using different methods like presentations, projects, and classroom written tests.
- Final examinations are conducted at the end of each semester.

- Self-assessment reports and Annual Performance Indicators (API) forms are filled by the teaching staff members regularly.

The College has not developed any curriculum for diploma or certificate course. However, the College has developed a curriculum for a 21-day short course, namely, 'Computer for All.' The contents for training programme for competitive examinations with Marathi as the compulsory paper has been designed by the College.

1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The institution has the following mechanisms to ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation:

Internal assessment tests enable the teachers to find out the extents to which stated objectives of the curriculum are achieved in the course of the curriculum. Since internal assessment is a continuous assessment, the result of these tests enables the teachers to adjust their styles of teaching to the needs of the students.

Final examination marks are the final test of the achievement of the stated objective of the curriculum. Students participate in a number of co-curricular activities, such as, enrichment programmes, study visits, competitions with academic content and extra-curricular activities such as street play, exhibitions, geo-fest, mock banking, tree plantation, interaction with school children in N.S.S. camps, blood donation, etc. Students write articles on current topics and current events in the College magazine 'Shabdotsav', which manifests their understanding of these issues.

The Placement Cell provides career guidance on interview technique; communication skills, group discussions. Newspaper articles related to competitive examinations and skills required for placements are displayed on the notice board. Information about entrance examination for the post graduate courses is communicated to the students, and guidance is provided for preparation of such examination. Group Discussions and mock group interviews are conducted. The Placement Cell provides counseling for improving English speaking and also guides for writing test and facing interviews. This makes the students aware of the corporate requirements and helps them to secure job which enables them to become economically self-reliant.

The Department of N.S.S. conducts Guest Lectures on topics like Woman and Law, Life Skills, Disaster Management, Stress Managements, Examination Anxiety, etc.

Courses offered in modular form

We do not offer courses in modular form.

We offer all the conventional programmes to the students which the University has authorized us to offer.

> Credit transfer and accumulation facility

If a student from some other college joins this institution the credits acquired by her in that college are accepted.

Enrichment courses

The Enrichment Programmes are conducted as a part of Foundation Course for B.A. Part 1 and Part 2. Women issues, personality development, and environmental issues are the core areas covered in enrichment programmes. Tally Programme is organized for B. Com. Part III students. Computerized Accounting is the basic necessity of the modern accounting world. Our students should have basic knowledge of computerized accounting. Hence, the Department of Commerce conducted a two-week Tally awareness course for the students of B. Com. Part III. Data entry and Tally Package, basic principles of accounting are taught to the students with the intention of imparting accounting and its software application.

Self-Financed Program - BCA

The Institution offers BCA Programme, which is a self-financed programme, based on computer technology (application). It has to stand on its own; hence, the fee structure is different from other regular programmes such as B.A. and B.Com. and thus comparatively on the higher side. The fee structure is decided according to the University instructions.

The curriculum of the course is quite different from the other regular programmes. It is designed by the University. It is a technical programme which gives more importance to practical knowledge. Considering the dynamism in computer applications, the syllabus is frequently modified to suit the requirements of industry. The programme is designed to develop employability skills amongst the students. The programme has semester system of the examination right from the beginning.

Admissions to the BCA programme are done purely on merit basis.

The appointments of subject teachers are done at the local level as per the procedure prescribed by the University. The committee which comprises subject experts and the University representatives selects the staff members through rigorous interviews. An approval is taken from the University. The salary is in the form of consolidated pay sanctioned by the University on the basis of budgetary provisions of the College.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programs, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such program and the beneficiaries.

- The B.A. and B.Com. students have to undergo 'Computer for All' programme, which is skill oriented and is relevant for the employment market.
- The College organized a hundred-hour soft skills training programme in collaboration with TCS for the last year B.A., B. Com. and BCA students
- A coaching for compulsory Marathi paper in competitive examinations like MPSC, UPSC is provided by the Department of Marathi
- The Department of Drawing and Painting undertakes additional skill oriented programmes, such as, Terra-cotta workshops, Coffee mural painting, and wall murals, etc.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programs and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The institution takes initiative to supplement the curriculum of the University. The Department of Computer Applications conducted a workshop on Content Analysis on 29 June 2009 and 8 June 2011.

The Department of Psychology also organized a workshop on Content Analysis of the practical course on 4 August 2014.

Teachers from the different departments have attended the workshops for Content Analysis organized by other colleges.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

The Institution enriches and organizes the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students to cope with the needs of the employment market. Students who have chosen 'Company Law and Secretarial Practice' as subject of specialization are sent in the College office by rotation to have practical work experience. Students from different programmes are given an opportunity to work in the University branch library under the UGC scheme 'Earn and Learn'.

- The Office Management undertakes job training outside the College in different organizations, such as, Hospitals, Co-operative Banks, Library, Doctor's Clinics, Private Sector Companies.
- The Business Communication is a compulsory paper at B.Com. I, II, III years.
- The Students from the Department of Psychology visit Government Hospital and similar organizations in Pune to develop deeper understanding of the subjects of Clinical Psychology and Abnormal Psychology. Students of the Departments of Geography, Psychology, Economics and Drawing and Painting are given an opportunity to view films which elaborate the concepts taught to them in the programmes. They also undertake various study visits, for example, to Observatory, Geological Museum at Ferguson College, Katraj Milk Dairy, Bank of Maharashtra, Overseas Branch, Muktangan Alcoholic Anonymous Centre, Agharkar Institute, and Kelkar Museum, etc.



- The Private sector companies take initiative to provide job training to the students through the Placement Cell. The Tata Consultancy Services provided a training programme of 100 hours to 50 students out of which 25 were selected for employment. The training was organized during 8 to 27 April 2013.
- Students of the Department of Drawing and Painting participate in the workshops which are organized to enhance their experiences to cope up with the needs of employment market. The short courses such as Terra-Cotta, Clay modeling, Calligraphy, Coffee Mural Painting, Madhubani Painting, etc., are designed by the Department.

The students who have taken Company Law and Secretarial Practice as their special subject are provided an opportunity to attend the Annual General Meeting of private sector corporations. During the last five years our students attended AGMs of Kirloskar Brothers, Praj Industries, Kalyani Investments, etc.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The Institution integrates the cross cutting issues such as Genders, Climate Changes, Environmental Education, Human Rights, and ICT, etc. in the curriculum.

B. Gender Equality

The Foundation course, which is a compulsory course for B.A. Part I and II, has a lot of content on gender issues. At B.A. Part I 'Status of Women in India' is a compulsory paper and at the B.A. II 'Current Concerns' is a compulsory paper which discusses gender related issues in current scenario. The Foundation Course requires the students to undergo the enrichment programme independently at B.A. Part I and II. Under these programmes contemporary issues are discussed in the presence of eminent speakers. For B.A. programme, books such as 'A Doll's house', 'Umrao Jaan', and 'Empowerment English' are prescribed in syllabus to familiarize the students with gender based issues. The students of Economics are taught the concept of Gender Budget in semester VI.

In the year 2013-14, a bicycle rally was organized from Pune to Kanyakumari for spreading the message of 'Saving the Girl Child'. 22 students participated in this event.



> Climate changes and Environment education

All Programmes have a foundation course on Environmental Issues which creates awareness about environmental issues. The Department of N.S.S. organized lectures on Disaster Management by Prof. Dandekar and Mrs. Iravati Nalawade. A Group Discussion with students was arranged on 'Management of Man-made Disater' on 23 January 2012. Workshop on Street Play was conducted and the topic was 'Water is Life' and 'Environment Protection'. Poster Making and Slogan Competitions were held on the subject 'Water conservation and Environment Protection' during Ganesh Festival. Workshops on preparing environment friendly Ganesh idols were organized for N.S.S. volunteers, who taught the same in different schools. A short film 'Kacharakondi' by Mr. Atul Pethe was shown to create awareness about the problem of waste disposal. N.S.S. Department participated in 'Swachchata Abhiyan' by Pune Municipal Corporation on 11February 2013. Workshops on paper-bag making were conducted by Dr. Alka Khade and Dr. Rajetri Kulkarni during N.S.S. special camps in different villages.

Staff Academy Department organized a programme on Everest Expedition conducted by Giripremi. Geography Department every year organizes Geofest to display models on various environmental projects. Bicycle rally from Pune to Kanyakumari was organized to spread the message of Environment Protection.

C. Human Rights

To make the students aware of Human Rights, Public meeting on the topic 'Nirbhaya Rape Case in Delhi and Self Defence' was organized on 11 January 2013. The speakers were Renu Gavaskar and Sanjyot Deshpande. Presentation of a story on 'Female Infanticide' was done by Dr. Priya Jamkar and Mr. Sunil Godse. A workshop on 'Right to Information Act' was organized. Mr. Vivek Velankar, an activist, was the key speaker for this program.

The Department of N.S.S. organized lectures on the topics like 'Premarital Counseling', 'Woman and Law', 'Woman Empowerment', 'Woman and Superstition'. A lecture on 'Female Infanticide' by Lalita Jogad was organized on 17 February 2011. Pratima Joshi gave a lecture on 'Woman Related Laws'. A film 'Janani' on woman infanticide was shown. Smt. Rajashree Nagarkar gave a lecture on 'Stress in Women' at the N.S.S. camp, in December 2011. A lecture on 'Woman and Society' was delivered by Smt. Sanjivani Jogalekar on 28 December 2012. 'Breast Cancer Awareness Drive' was also organized on 4 February 2014. Dr. Shona Nag was the key speaker for the programme.



The Department of N.S.S. conducts medical check-up camps every year. It organizes street plays on gender issues. Survey on Perception of parents regarding higher education of girls of Ambi village was conducted in camp during 2010-11.

The N.S.S. Department conducted a survey of 'Opinions of people in different strata of the society on the issue of Female Infanticide'.

> ICT:

ICT workshop was conducted in collaboration with The University for the staff members. All the departments make use of ICT and LCD Projector in teaching various topics.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses / enrichment programs offered to ensure holistic development of students?

➤ Moral and ethical values

Various special days are celebrated in the College to inculcate moral and ethical values among the students. Teachers' Day, Gurupournima, Women's Day, Independence Day, Gandhi Jayanti, Maharshi Karve Day, Republic Day, Savitribai Phule Jayanti and Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Mahanirwan Din are celebrated with organization of lectures, cultural programmes or workshops for students.

> Employability and life skills

Computer for All is a course organized for all the students of B. A. and B. Com. Programmes. Personality Development Course for students of B.A. I pogramme helps in developing various life skills amongst them. Programmes like life skill education, coaching for competitive examinations, workshops on communication skills and interview technique, TCS hundred hours programme on employability skills are a few examples of programmes organized by the College for developing employability and life skills. Exhibitions by past and present students at the time of Annual Social Gathering set an example before the present generation to develop skills for self employment. Study Tours of Geography and BVA Dept help the students to develop organizing skills.

Better career options

Career Guidance Lectures and exhibitions are organized in the College to make them aware about the various career options available for them after graduation. Guest Lectures of eminent professionals and specialists are arranged to motivate students to make their careers.

D. Community Orientation

All N.S.S., N.C.C., and extension programmes are implemented with the basic objective of developing community orientation among the students.

CRITERION II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

Introduction

In the knowledge era, the College tries to provide student-centric, technology-driven, and quality knowledge to the students. Through the teaching-learning process, our objective is to empower the students to meet the challenges of life.

The process begins with admission of students in the College. In order to ensure systematic and transparent admission process, the College appoints an Admission Committee every year. This Committee also ensures that prescribed SNDT Women's University norms and the norms of the State government are followed while admitting the students to the College.

In the institution our teachers try to make teaching as student-centric as possible and make learning more interactive, creative, and collaborative. With the changing times, trends, and technological changes, the teachers equip themselves and respond to the new challenges. For continuous improvement in teaching skills and techniques, the College encourages the staff members to participate in conferences, seminars, workshops, and faculty development programmes. Thus teachers are well equipped to impart latest knowledge and skills to the students.

For overall personality development of our students, the College undertakes various curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Every year teaching plan for each subject and the calendar for curricular activities are prepared. Along with regular classroom teaching, curricular activities include foundation courses, enrichment lecture series, project presentations, practicals and demonstrations for Fine Arts, Geography, Psychology, BCA and Vocational B. Com. Programmes.


Curricular activities, such as, study tours, Geo-fest, Computer-Fest, lectures by experts, workshops, mock bank, etc., are organised for advancement of our students. Extracurricular activities, such as, the N.S.S., N.C.C., Youth Festivals, Annual Social Gathering, workshops on soft skills and personality development are organised to develop creativity skills, leadership qualities, and social awareness among the students. Thus institution tries to achieve its objective of women empowerment through curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

One of the ways of evaluating outcomes of teaching learning process is examinations. Continuous evaluation for our students is done through internal examinations, which include tutorials, projects, presentations, group discussions etc. Summative Evaluation is done at the end of each semester for all the subjects. Examination committee of the College ensures that all the examination and assessment work is done systematically and according to



time schedule. The results are declared on time as per the guidelines of the SNDT Women's University and State Government.

In this way, through teaching, learning and evaluation process the College not only imparts necessary knowledge skills but also enriches lives of the our students, which can be seen from the following chart:

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Academic year starts with college admissions. For ensuring publicity and transparency in the admission process we practice the following procedures.

A) Publicity in Admission Process

- Counseling is given at the time of twelfth standard send off.
- Pamphlets are made in Marathi (local language) and English language, and distributed to the daily news papers at the time of twelfth Standard result.
- A "Career Guidance Exhibition" is organized for the students and parents. Information about relevance of programmes, advanced career and job opportunities of the courses offered is displayed through flex boards and posters.
- Teachers visit junior colleges for girls and give presentation about the College and programmes conducted.
- For Bachelor of Visual Arts programmes, banners are displayed in campus as well as in Junior colleges informing about the programmes. The exhibition of paintings of College students is displayed in the Department at the time of admissions.

B) Transparency in Admission Process

- Every year Admission Committee is formed, according to the UGC norms, to scrutinize the applications received.
- College prepares merit lists on the basis of the applications received and displays it on the notice board.
- On-line admission procedure has been adopted since 2013-2014.

The SNDT Women's University does not have any other affiliated or constituent colleges in the vicinity. Hence, the comparision is not provided.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes', what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Mechanism to review admission process

- The College reviews the entire admission process after the completion of admissions for the year. Difficulties faced in the admission process are discussed in detail. Solutions are found out. Instructions about the admission policies for the next year are given to the teachers as well as to the non-teaching colleagues.
- Convenient arrangement and proper layout of admission venue is provided to the students so that the admission process is facilitated. Counseling is offered to each student for all subjects. Teachers of every faculty remain present at the time of admission and guide the students in filling the forms, selecting the subjects, etc. Proforma of duly filled fees Challan with all the details is displayed on the notice board for the students.



- The College has an Admissions Committee. The committee scrutinizes the forms, then finalizes the list according to the merit and government norms and displays the list on the notice board for the final admission.
- From the commencement of the first term, the College monitors performance of the students in the subjects offered by them. If a student finds it difficult to cope up with the subject offered by her, she is given the necessary counseling or is advised to change the subject.
- Students, who have not studied subjects like accountancy or mathematics at the 12th level, are provided necessary support on personal level by the teachers

From the above table, it is quite clear that

- About 25 percent parents could not complete their education up to the X standard.
- About 25 percent parents have completed their education maximum up to the XII standard.
- ➤ Only 10.33 percent parents could complete their graduation.



The above analysis shows that the parents are not keen about education. Hence, they are less enthusiastic about their childrens' education. As a result, they do not want their girl child to complete her graduation. They want her to get married before completing her graduation.

As the students do not get any motivation from their family members, they, too, don't pay much attention to studies. Students as well as their parents fail to understand the importance of education in their lives.

In this scenario, the teachers play a vital role in the College as well as in the lives of the students.

With the main objective of imparting education to women, the SNDT Arts and Commerce College for Women was established 98 years ago. Though some sections of the society have accepted co-education on a wide scale for the girls, some financially and educationally backward segments of the society prefer to take admission to our Women's College even today. Their parents are mostly drop outs from schools and prefer their children to study in Women's College. Many of our students are the First Generation Learners. Thus, our institute contributes to the national commitment by the inclusion of such under-privileged, educationally backward sections of the society. Consequently, a need for a women's college is still felt.

The applications received for all programmes are showing a declining trend due to following reasons.

- Increasing inclination for technical, professional and vocational courses over traditional courses like B.A. and B.Com.
- Students give preference to co-education, and, hence, opt for other options available in the city.

Considering the declining trend in admissions, the College authorities took the following measures to increase the admissions, such as

- Pamphlets are made in Marathi (local language) and English language, and distributed to the daily newspapers at the time of the XII Standard result
- Counseling is provided at the time of XII standard send off.
- "Career Guidance Exhibition" is organized for students and parents. Information about merits, advantages and job opportunities of various courses is displayed through flex boards and posters.
- Teachers visit various junior colleges in the city and give presentation about the College and courses conducted.
- For BVA course, banners are displayed in campus as well as in near by Junior colleges informing about the course. Exhibition of paintings of College Students is displayed in the Department at the time of admission to create interest amongst the students.

2.2 Students' Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The SNDT Arts and Commerce College has been established with the main intention of making women self sufficient. Among the women population, those who are differently abled, need special teaching-learning support. Our institution is committed to this cause and ensures adherence to the Government policies by doing following things:

• The institution gives admission to differently abled students. The institution has a few students who are blind, polio affected, disabled, deaf and slow learners. The teachers and peer students take special care of such students so that they can cope up with the studies and the College environment.



- The institution provides suitable classrooms for physically challenged students.
- Teachers guide personally to slow learners and accommodate them in the class. The teachers encourage other students to help them.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

For admission to under graduate programmes in our college, minimum requirement is passing the higher secondary examination. We have two Fine Arts programmes run in the College viz. B.A. (Music) and BVA (Visual Arts). Both these courses require skills of a certain level. Hence, before the commencement of both the programmes, to understand the knowledge and skills of the students, audition test in Music and drawing test in Visual arts are conducted

If the performance of the student is not up to a particular level, it is certain that she may not be able to complete the programme. These students are advised to opt for any other programme.

For the BCA programme, a Bridge Course is conducted for the students who did not offer mathematics and/or Accountancy in the XII standard. This bridge course is compulsory to qualify for the BCA degree programme.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Addon/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Bridge course

As mentioned earlier, a bridge course is conducted for the BCA students. This professional course requires the knowledge of mathematics and Accountancy. The students who do not offer mathematics and/or Accountancy in the 12th standard take admission for the professional programme. To make these students familiar with the terminology of both the courses and to cope with the programme of their choice, a Bridge Course is provided.

> Remedial courses

Remedial courses are conducted for subjects, in which the percentage of failure is more. Basic knowledge is imparted to these students through remedial courses so that the students can attempt the question paper successfully. The ATKT-students are listed and remedial courses are conducted for them. These Courses are of short duration. In the reporting year, the College conducted Remedial Courses in Economics, English, and Statistics. Weak students undergo micro teaching, additional class tests, extra practicals and oral tests.



Add On Course

For the students of B.A., B.Com. and BVA add- on course namely "Computer for All" is conducted every year. Through this three-week programme, basic knowledge of computer technology is provided to the students.

> Enrichment course

We have foundation courses for four semesters for B.A. programme. For B.A. Part I, "Status of Women in India" and "History as Heritage" are the courses for the semester I and "Personality Development" and "Environmental Studies" for semester II. The course "Current Concern" is for B.A. Part II, for semester III and IV. These courses include information about various legal provisions for women, health issues, women's rights and other issues related to women empowerment. In the enrichment course, a lecture series is organised to cover these topics. This lecture series is useful to provide more information and the students get an opportunity to listen to experts. The main objectives of this lecture series are personality development of our students and creating awareness about social and global issues. To enhance the overall personality of the students following lectures were arranged.

2.2.4 How does the College sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

Gender

Women's empowerment is the motto of our Institution. All the activities in the College revolve around this objective.

- A foundation course "Status of Women" is included in the curriculum of B. A. part I. Besides, street plays, Essay competitions on women related issues are organised. For example, on the occasion of the World Cancer Day a street play was organized and a lecture on breast cancer was arranged in the interest of the students and staff of the College.
- In order to sensitize the staff members and the students about women related issues, the College frequently organizes programmes focusing on status of women in society, rights of women in family, women's health, etc.
- During the Cycle Rally, the students performed street plays at various places on the theme of 'Save Girl Child'.

• Environment

Protection of the environment is an important issue at the moment. It is assumed that if the students are made aware of the issues through the curriculum, they will take appropriate actions. Hence, to sensitize the students on this vital problem it is included in the curriculum.

The College takes efforts to sensitize its staff and students on environmental issues by using different methods:

• Curriculum: For all the programmes in the first year, a course entitled "Environmental Studies" is compulsory and it deals with all the issues related to environment. At the B.A. Part II level, a course 'Current Concerns' includes pollution as one of the major components. In B.A. (Geography special) programme, there are three separate courses which deal with environmental issues. A course which is for B.A. III students is entitled 'Environmental Science', and a course for B.A. II (Semester III) is 'Natural Hazards and Management', and for Semester IV 'Man-Made Disaster and Management'.



Thus, all the courses included in different programmes, help to sensitize the students about the environment and the environmental problems. While dealing with the courses, projects and assignments are given to the students.

To raise the interest about the environmental issues, different methods and approaches are followed. They are given below:

• Lectures and Slide Shows: To give additional information to the students, lectures and slide shows are arranged. Generally, the lectures focusing on current issues and incidences are conducted. For example, before the Solar Eclipse, a lecture by Prof. P.K. Ghanekar, on "Solar Eclipse" was arranged and after Tsunami in Japan, a lecture on "Tsunami and Disaster Management" by Prof. Anil Dandekar was arranged. The details of other lectures and slide shows are given below:

- In general, it could be said that 50 per cent of the students get assistance under the different schemes. One important point that needs to be highlighted is that our staff members come forward to help the needy and deserving students to provide financial help with a condition of not disclosing their names.
- Inclusion of the students from the rural areas: The SNDT Arts and Commerce College for Women is well known; it has hostel facility and many students from rural areas of Maharashtra take admission. Every year nearly 20 per cent to 25 per cent of our students are from rural areas or from villages near Pune city. 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

- A Students' Council is formed every year, which consists of topper from each class. It tries to develop leadership qualities and overall personality of these students through various activities.
- The College encourages bright students to take part in elocution and essay competitions organized by other institutions.
- Students from Music and Visual Arts Department are encouraged to participate in local cultural events and competitions organized by renowned institutions and youth festivals of other institutions.
- Every year, the College forms a Study Circle, comprising students having better ability than the other students. The study circle endeavors to give these advanced learners something more. The College forms the study



circle by drawing two or three students from each class according to their merit. In order to provide food for thought and improve analyzing ability, the study circle organizes various programmes. Group Discussions based on current issues are arranged. Debate competition is also organised. This helps to increase their general knowledge and their ability to talk persuasively and logically. The students are also encouraged to give presentations. Conscious efforts are made to inculcate leadership qualities and team spirit among the members of the Study Circle by involving them in organizing various programmes in the College.

- The advanced learners are given lists of additional books, journals and web-links.
- These students are also encouraged to attend lectures of experts and eminent personalities, relating to their subjects, organised outside the College.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

- The office maintains information about the students who are from economically backward section. Financial help is provided by the College and the staff members to the needy students.
- The staff members provide information about 'Earn and Learn' scheme of central library to the students.
- Remedial courses are conducted for academically weak students.
- Placement Cell tries to give information about part time jobs to the students for supporting their expenses.
- Teachers provide counseling to the students and even to their parents for completing graduation.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The teachers prepare the teaching plans at the beginning of the year and submit them to the College. The teachers try to follow the plans as far as possible. The Head of the Department guides, assists, and monitors to ensure that the objectives of the teaching plan are achieved.



The Academic calendar for the College is prepared every year on the basis of plans given by each department regarding their curricular activities. This involves lectures by experts, field visits of students, academic fests, etc.

There is a provision for assessing the students' knowledge and skills for each academic year. There is a provision for evaluating students' performance through internal and external examinations. During last five years examination pattern of the College has changed from annual to semester pattern. Evaluation schedule of the College for the last five years is given below.

For the Internal evaluation, along with written tests, the teachers assign individual and group projects, presentations and group discussions.

For the External examination, the Part I and Part II Examinations were conducted at the College level till 2012-13. For the final year students, paper setting and correction was done at the University level. From the academic year 2013-14, Part II and Part III level external examinations are conducted by the University.



2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching —learning process?

IQAC of the College contributes to improve the teaching learning process in the following way.

- The IQAC observes preparation of semester-wise teaching plans by each teacher.
- Time-table committee sets the timetable and its implementation is monitored by the IQAC.
- Attendance records are checked regularly.
- Students' feedback is collected, analyzed and reported to the Principal.
- The IQAC monitores that API forms are filled by all the permanent teachers in time.
- The IQAC encourages the departments to undertake innovative teaching methods. Geo Fest by the Department of Geography, use of ICT in teaching in many subjects, projects, study tours and visits, computer fests, surveys, and exhibitions are the innovative methods followed by the departments regularly.
- It monitores the working of different departments and committees in compliance with the academic calendar.
- It organizes seminars for Quality Enhancement of the teaching staff members.
- It initiated add-on courses and short courses for the students like MS Office, Corel Draw and Tally, during the vacations.
- The teaching staff is deputed to participate in seminars and conferences organized by different academic bodies in Maharashtra and outside the state.
- The College has Staff Academy Cell which organizes programmes for improvement of teaching skills and techniques for the teachers.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

In the institution our teachers try to make teaching as student-centric as possible and make learning more interactive, creative and collaborative.

- ➤ The College provides following support structure and systems to the teachers:
 - The first step in making learning student-centric is to provide essential infrastructure to the teachers, such as, well-equipped library, computer laboratory with internet facility, LCD and other visual aids.



- For continuous improvement in teaching skills and techniques the College encourages the staff members to participate in refresher and orientation programmes.
- To impart the latest knowledge and skills to the student, the College supports the teachers to participate in conferences, seminars, workshops and faculty development programmes.
- The College encourages the staff members to undertake research work for which the necessary assistance is provided to them by the institution.
- When there is change in a particular course or syllabus of a particular subject the College organizes Content Analysis workshop or deputes the teachers to attend such type of workshops organized by other colleges.
- To make teaching learning student-centric, the following efforts are taken:
 - Student empowerment is the objective of teaching learning process in our college. Due to poor educational and financial family background of the students, they depend more on the teachers for their development. As teachers are aware of this fact, they use different teaching methods to make learning more interesting and fruitful. As the College runs B.A., B.Com., BVA, and BCA programmes, it provides ample scope for using variety of teaching methods.
 - The B.A. programme can be divided into two segments viz. Social Sciences and languages. The methods like surveys, study tours, field visits, projects, Geo-fests, mock bank, and case study are used in Social Sciences. The details of the same are as below:

A. Study Tour

It is organized by the Department of Geography every year. In order to understand various aspects of Geography along with classroom teaching field visits are essential. Study tours help to understand different landforms, types of vegetations, birds, clouds, etc. The visits also help to study settlement patterns, transport systems, tourist centres.

Objectives—Geography being a field-oriented subject, it is necessary to conduct a study tour

- a. To train the students in field observations and drawing conclusions from the observations.
- b. Landforms, forest types, soil and rock types, settlement patterns etc. are the factors which can be shown and described in the field more effectively.
- c. To develop perspective of field identification field visits are necessary.

- B. Survey method in Economics helps to understand various economic factors and their impacts. The Department of Economics conducts surveys on such topics as "Survey of self employed women in Pune", "Study of Private expenditure on higher education by parents in Pune", etc. These surveys help the students to get practical experience of data collection, data analysis and report writing.
- C. Experiment method is widely used in Psychology. In this method, the students of other Departments participate as "Subject" of the experiments. This practical experience helps in concept clarification.
- D. Audio visual aids, such as films, dramas based on prescribed novels and plays are used by the Departments of Marathi and English.
- E. Role plays are used by the Department of English in order to improve conversational skills of the students.
- F. In B. Com. Programme group discussions, presentations, problem solving, case study, and simulation (Mock AGM) methods are used.



- G. Projects and presentations help to develop confidence, creativity of the students and make them familiar with the latest technology.
- H. Case Studies, in Accountancy Course, are given to the students on one of the topics from the syllabus Ratio Analysis. Annual Reports of companies are made available to each student and they analyze the financial statements and present the report. This activity gives exposure to the latest presentation methods for financial results. Students get practical knowledge of the subject.
- I. Practice and performance methods are widely used in the BVA and B.A. Music programmes. The students of Music Department are given opportunity to perform in various functions organized in the College. The students of the Department of Drawing and Painting exhibit their paintings.
- J. Workshops are conducted for teaching the Clay modeling, murals, poster making, collage, and installations, etc.
- K. Project method is widely used in the BCA and BVA programmes.
- ➤ The teachers use a variety of teaching and learning methods to make learning more interactive, collaborative and independent.

A. Interactive learning

- To motivate the students to work in a pair or groups, projects, group discussions, quiz, study tours and field visits, surveys and geo-fest are organized. Projects are given as assignments to the students, while doing projects; the students help their group mates and other students as well. Each one of them tries to do the best project in the class. Geofest is an exhibition, where all the students from the Department of Geography participate enthusiastically. They work as a group and it helps them to understand the importance of working together as a group.
- Geo-fest- An exhibition of geographical models, charts, the P.P.T. presentations etc.

Objectives-

- a. To develop the skills like map making, model making, etc.
- b. To develop the skill of presentation.
- c. To make students to understand geographical phenomenon more intensely.
- d. To create environmental awareness through Saplings sale.

> Collaborative Learning:

In the college, some activities and programmes are conducted by the collaboration between two departments. *Bhajans* of Meera is a part of syllabus in Hindi literature. The faculty of Departments of Hindi and Music compose these Bhajans. These *Bhajans* are sung by the students of the Department of Music.

In the Department of Geography, for the BA III, writing a Journal is compulsory for the Practical Course. To guide how to write the journal, a Calligraphy workshop is organized. The faculty from the Department of Drawing and Painting guides the students. They also guide the students to prepare a Book-jacket for the cover of Report of Study Tour.

The Departments of Commerce and Economics collaboratively organize guest lectures, workshops on 'career guidance' and 'soft skills'.




2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- To develop critical thinking among the students, the College organizes various competitions such as Essay Writing, Debate, Elocution and Personality Contest, Quiz, etc.
- For developing scientific temper and creativity among the students, the College organizes Geo fests, Computer fests. One example of unleashing the creativity amongst the students is the frequent organization of Street plays on Social issues, especially related to women. Painting exhibitions also bring out the creativity in students.
- For the all-round development of students, the department of Cultural activities organizes different competitions such as Folk Dance, Classical Dance, Classical and Light Music competitions, Mehandi and Rangoli, Clay Modeling, and Poster Making competitions, One Act Plays, etc.
- For advanced learners in the College, the Study Circle is formed every year. Through the Study Circle and the Students' Council various activities are organized in order to develop critical thinking, leadership qualities and creativity among the advanced learners. The study circle organizes workshops on group discussion, personality development, interview techniques, and lectures by experts. The members of study circle organize programmes on Teachers' Day, Guru-Pournima, etc. They work as volunteers in various programmes organized in the College. They conduct some competitions as a part of Annual Social Gathering. All these activities help in overall personality development of these students. The following chart gives list of extra-curricular and co-curricular activities.

- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.
- The College has a Computer laboratory with internet facility and LAN, CD- writer, and scanner. Teachers use computers and internet to facilitate learning. Students are encouraged to use presentation techniques and the internet to enhance their knowledge. Scanner is used for scanning articles, notes, maps, photographs, and books. This is especially useful, since the teachers can scan the latest material that is not yet found in the standard texts. Very old and valuable books are also made available to the students, which otherwise could not have been possible.



- Film shows are organized in the Departments of Drawing and Painting, Marathi, Music, and English to provide advanced information of the subject. For the commerce students, Management Films for Leadership and Team Building are shown. The Department of Economics had organized a film show on the topic of Self-Help Groups. The N.S.S. Department had organized a film show on social issues such as Garbage Management.
- The well-equipped and modern centralized library stocks over 83000 books and also provides access to databases like Proquest. It has Computer facility with internet. The LCD and other visual aids are also available to the teachers through the library.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- ➤ The teaching plans and the curricular activities are geared towards student advancement. Not only the students learn about their subjects but are also encouraged to think and be creative.
 - In order to provide the latest and practical knowledge of the subject, every Department arranges lectures by experts, on the contemporary and important topics.
 - Every year the College organizes lecture series under the 'Enrichment Programme' on current issues and issues related to women for B.A. I and B.A. II students.
 - Workshops have proved to be an effective medium in inculcating specific skills and knowledge in students. Workshops organized on Personality Development, Calligraphy, Career Guidance, etc. have helped the students tremendously in their all-round development.
 - The student learning exercise in not confined only to the College boundaries. Field Visits, Study Tours are arranged by concerned departments to provide practical, in depth knowledge of the subject and increase students' interaction with the external world.
 - Departmental Libraries Most of the departments in the College have their own subject libraries. The students can use books in these libraries to enhance their knowledge.
 - In today's competitive world, Soft Skills are an important tool for the students. The College recognizes this and is working on it. The training programme organized by TCS (Tata Consultancy Services) for final year students of our College was an important step in this direction. The College also sends students for the workshops organized by the other institutions, whenever possible.



- ➤ For Teachers advancement following efforts are made:
 - For career advancement, all the permanent staff members are sent for the Refresher and Orientation courses. Many of the staff members have attended the N.S.S. orientation programme.
 - Two faculty members have received the U.G.C. fellowship and study leave for Ph.D.
 - Various faculty development programmes and workshops are organized by the College every year, which in the recent years include workshops on Information and Communication Technology (15 beneficiaries), Advanced Formatting Technique (15 beneficiaries), Right to Information (25 beneficiaries), Workshop on Teaching effectiveness (30 beneficiaries) and 2 Workshops on Content analysis by the Departments of Psychology and Computer.
 - The Staff Academy has been especially formed to have interaction of the teachers with leading experts from outside the College. A team of senior teachers ensures by inviting renowned personalities to share their knowledge and expertise with the teachers.
 - Inter-departmental and Intra-departmental associations amongst the teachers are encouraged. The Department of Drawing and Painting conducts classes to enhance the creative spirit.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students / benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/ mentoring/ academic advice) provided to students?

• The Department of Psychology runs a "Counseling Center" for the students of our college. Personal counseling is provided to the needy students by the expert staff members. The staff is known for its counseling ability and is recognized by counseling agencies such as Jnana Prabodhini. Dr. Manasee Rajhans looks after the counseling cell. Through this cell counseling is provided for problems like academic failures, severe stress, social phobia, career counseling, marital issues etc.

• The College organizes Career Exhibition for all the students of the senior and junior wings. Every Department in the senior College hosts a stall which gives detailed information of the subject and future career



- opportunities. Flex boards mentioning the course details, future career and employment options available to the students are displayed. The staff members provide information and guidance not only to the students but to their parents, as well. Many students visit the Exhibition.
- As most of our students come from lower socio economic background, personal counseling is provided to these students on academic, personal and other problems.
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
- The College is always willing to provide financial and other required support for Innovative Teaching Practices. This has encouraged the teachers to take up projects such as:
- The Economics Department organizes Mock Banking session in which the students participate in running a bank operation. Similarly the experience of taking part in Mock Bank provides practical insights to the students regarding bank operations. Role plays by the students help in concept clarification. Visits to Overseas Branch of Bank open new vistas of knowledge for the students.
- Geo Fest organized by the Department of Geography is an annual exciting event looked forward to by all. In this fest models, charts and maps giving information about different geographical aspects are prepared and exhibited by the students. Information about these visually interesting models is provided to the visitors by the students of Geography. This activity helps in concept clarification as well as to develop critical thinking, creativity and presentation skills of the participating students.
- Students from the Department of Drawing and Painting enhance their artistic skills through activities such as stage decoration, rangoli decoration and board writing for various functions organized by the college. The Department also organizes an exhibition of posters and paintings made by the students.
- Computer Fest The Department of Computer Application tries to provide the latest and up-to-date knowledge to the students. Organisation of Computer Fest (Festival) is an activity for giving additional inputs to the students of BCA. The Computer Fest covers programming skills, net working, development of software and project work. It has a combination of theoretical knowledge and practical skill. Computer Fest is our annual



feature since 2001. The activities are carried out along with the students of Vocational Computer Application.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The students and staff members of the College have access to the central library in the campus. This library has more than 83,000 books on different subjects. At the same time some of the departments in the College have their own departmental libraries. Both the libraries help the students in their studies.

- ➤ The Main Library provides the following facilities to the students and teachers:
 - Latest data and information are made available through the books, journals, magazines, year-books and internet.
 - Newspapers and weekly magazine available in the library give information about current events and issues.
 - A variety of books on numerous subjects provide ample information to the readers.
- > Departmental Library provides following benefits:
 - Information and data related to the specific subject is made available.
 - Ready reference for the teachers as well as to the students is accessible.
 - Practice material for subjects like accountancy is made available.
 - Question papers and question banks of the subjects concerned are provided.
 - Newspaper cuttings related to important events are well preserved.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes. The College had faced the following circumstances when it was difficult to complete the curriculum within the planned time frame.

➤ Teaching faculty of the College took part in the Teachers' Strike initiated by the MFUCTO during 2009-10. The teachers compensated the loss of teaching days by working on Sundays and holidays.



- During 2009-10, due to the outbreak of Swine flu in Pune city, the normal functioning of the College was disturbed for about two weeks. The loss of teaching days was compensated by working during Diwali vacation.
- Those teachers who attend refresher and orientation courses make up for the lost teaching days by taking extra lectures.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- In the beginning of academic year, the teaching plans are prepared by all the teachers.
- In order to maintain quality of teaching and learning, the Principal and other senior authorities of the College monitor day-to-day working of the College. The Principal takes regular feedback from the Heads of the Department about the implementation of the timetable, completion of syllabus, etc.
- College conducts Internal Examination as a continuous evaluation process.
- Examination results are one of the ways to monitor teaching learning process. Every year, each department analyses results and they are discussed in the Staff Meeting. Measures for improvement are suggested, wherever necessary.
- Students' Feedback is taken every year from the students. This feedback is analyzed and discussed with the teachers concerned.

- The teaching positions are of two types: (a) substantive posts; (b) temporary posts. As far as the filling of the substantive posts is concerned, the posts have to be widely advertised, applications have to be invited, a selection committee has to be set up adhering to the procedure stipulated in the Maharashra Universities Act, 1994, and the UGC regulations in this regard. The appointed teacher is put on probation of two years, now of one year, after the VI Pay Revision; he/she is confirmed after his/her satisfactory completion of the probationary period. When it comes to filling of the temporary posts and leave vacancies, the local selection committee fills the posts. The composition of this committee is as per the University rules. The rules regarding reservation are meticulously observed while filling substantive as well as temporary posts.
- New teaching positions are created when new subjects are started, additional options are introduced.
- The University conducts this College; the appointing authority is the Vice-Chancellor. The University Selection Committee interviews candidates to be appointed to the Government Funded posts.
- For filling the Self-Funded posts, the University has delegated the authority to the College. The College receives a number of unsolicited application letters every year. While filling the self-funded posts, the College does take these into consideration. Hence, every time it has to fill a vacancy, it does not have to advertise it.
- The College appoints teachers on temporary/ ad-hoc basis. A panel of experts interviews the candidates. The decision of the interview panel is communicated to the University, and the University authorities issue appointment letters to the selected candidates. Salaries are paid out of the funds provided by the University.
- In the case of self-supporting courses like BCA or Vocational B.A./B.Com., the honorarium of ad-hoc teachers is paid through the fees collected from the students



- 2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.
 - As per the recent G.R, the age of super annuation has been raised from 60 to 62 years, which helps the University and the College to retain qualified senior faculty for additional two years
 - For BCA course, training to teachers and inputs for every subject are provided so that the teachers can cope up with the emerging area like computer application.
 - When new syllabus is introduced or the subjects are changed, workshops are conducted for teachers for understanding the contents of the subject. Question banks are prepared for every subject.

 - The College encourages the teachers to undertake research and academic publications. The College provides information to the staff about various schemes of the UGC and other funding agencies regarding research and publication grants.
 - College motivates teachers to undertake research. Two faculty members have been awarded the UGC fellowship with study leave under Faculty Improvement Programme (FIP) for three years for pursuing Ph. D.
 - Two major research projects were sanctioned by the UGC.



- College supports staff members to attend seminars, present and publish papers in various conferences and seminars by sanctioning duty leave.
 Partial financial assistance is provided to the staff members for presenting research papers in the seminars.

The Following faculty members have received awards during the last five years.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Our institution follows the policy of evaluation of teachers by the students in the form of students' feedback. Every year students give feedback about teaching quality of the teachers. The teachers concerned are communicated the positive and negative feedback and are directed to take corrective measures to improve their teaching performance.

2.5 Evaluation process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

In the beginning of academic year in the staff meeting the teachers are informed about the evaluation pattern given by the University. Students are also communicated about the nature of examination, evaluation process and reforms.

- The College conducts internal examination for all the semesters and the external examinations for part I and II for all programmes. The University conducts external examination for part III. The University started conducting external examinations for Part II and Part III students from 2013-14. The prospectus contains all the required information about evaluation methods.
- The Principal provides information to the first year students about the internal assessment scheme and the annual or semester examination pattern in the Welcome Address.
- At the beginning of the academic year, every teacher, provides details of the evaluation method to their students.



2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the University that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

From 2009-10 the University has adopted semester pattern and credit system in place of annual pattern for B.A. and B. Com. It was applicable to the first year students in 2009-10. In 2010-11, it was made applicable to the first and second year students and from 2011-12. The College has adopted these reforms since 2009-10.

For the Department of Drawing and Painting, the University has adopted a four- year degree programme with the semester pattern and credit system in place of annual pattern from 2008-09.

The College encourages teachers to use different evaluation techniques according to the need of the subject for internal evaluation like projects, presentations, group discussions, surveys, report writing, etc.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University and those initiated by the institution on its own?

Effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University and those initiated by the institution are discussed in the staff meeting, suggestions are invited, and accordingly, changes are made in the method of evaluation, for example, during the academic year 2010-11, the internal tests were conducted during a fixed time period. All classes and departments conducted tests during that particular week. Time table, supervision arrangements for the internal examination were made but it was found time-consuming and less effective from students' side. Considering this fact after a discussion in the staff meeting, the following year it was decided to conduct tutorials according to convenience of students and teachers.

- Procedure for College-level examination: Every year the Examination Committee is formed. For each subject paper setting is done at College level. Examination time table, supervision charts are prepared by the examination committee, and then displayed on the notice board. As per the time table, examination is conducted with due vigilance. For College level examination, evaluation is done by College teachers and results are declared following the University rules. Internal and external marks are submitted to the office.
- Internal examination: During each semester for internal examinations, two tutorials for each subject are to be given, in specified time period. Best performance out of the two tests is considered for the final results.
- Procedure for external examinations- The University level examinations are conducted as per the University directives. Notices and time-tables of



external examination received from the University are displayed on the notice board for the information of students and teachers. For University examination, Centralized Assessment Programme (CAP) is organized by the University, in which our faculty members participate every year. The rules of examination are displayed.

2.5.4 Provide details on the Formative and Summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

- Formative assessment is accomplished by using the following methods:
 - The Question-answer method is used along with the lecture method.
 - Group discussions are conducted for some of the topics.
 - Presentations by the students are encouraged in almost every programme.
 - Solving additional examples for subjects like Accountancy and Statistics.
 - Collecting additional/related information by students on the topics covered in the class. (Newspapers/Magazine Cuttings /the Internet, etc.)
 - Quiz is conducted for some topics.
 - Teachers use different methods for internal evaluation like group discussions, projects, presentations, field visit reports, etc.

> Summative Assessment:

- Two tutorial examinations of twenty-five marks each are conducted for every subject per semester.
- At the end of each semester external examination of seventy-five marks is conducted for each subject.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvement made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of student. (Weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning and etc.)

- The Corrected answer sheets of the students are circulated among the students for their perusal. Students are appraised about their performance while answering the questions. Model answers are discussed and every student is appraised about where and why she has gone wrong while answering the questions.
- Behavioral aspect- the students are assessed for their overall behavior, punctuality, and sincerity of the work in their class room activities and interactions with peers and teachers.
- ➤ Independent learning- Students are assessed from the projects, presentations, and their participation in exhibitions and music concerts, etc.



2.5.6 What are the graduates attributes specified by College or affiliating University? How does the College ensure the attainment of these by the students.

- Following are the graduate attributes specified by the University.
 - Women's empowerment
 - Overall personality development
 - Enabling students to develop into self-reliant individuals.
 - Providing necessary skills to face competition.
 - Offer latest knowledge, information, and skills according to the needs of the time.
- ➤ The College ensures the attainment of these objectives through the following activities.
 - The University has designed foundation courses for B.A. Part I and II students.
 - Every year the College organises enrichment lecture series for B.A. Part I and II students.
 - In order to provide additional and latest information to the students, each department organizes guest lectures, field visits, workshops, seminars, Geo-Fest, Computer Fest, etc.
 - Extra-curricular activities such as youth festival, general knowledge quiz, annual social gathering, personality contest, sports competitions are organised for over all personality development.
 - N.C.C., N.S.S., and sports activities play a very important role in the personality development of the students.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the College and University Levels?

For the College-level examination (I year), after the results are declared, students can apply for revaluation in a specified period, if they have any grievances. For the University examination (II year and III year), too, students can apply for revaluation in a specified period.

Answer sheets of the students are verified for total marks secured and the change in result (if any) is communicated to the students.

There is provision of supplying photocopies of the original answer-sheets to the students, on demand.

2.6 Students' performance and learning outcomes.

2.6.1 Does the College have clearly stated learning outcomes?

Yes, every department analyses the results and presents the result outcome at the time of staff meeting. Achievements are appreciated while failures are introspected. Measures for better results are suggested.



2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/program? College conducts internal and external examinations in semester pattern. For some programs practicals are also conducted.

For the B.A. Programme, the passing percentage of students is increasing. Our students have secured ranks in the University examination.

For the B. Com. Programme, the passing percentage of students is consistently increasing.

For the BVA Programme, the passing percentage of students is increasing. Our students have secured ranks in the University examination.

For the BCA Programme, passing percentage of students has decreased even though the College is providing the necessary inputs consistently. Corrective actions are in progress, such as, extra assignments and practice sessions for students, and remedial teaching.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievements of the intended learning outcomes?

Majority of our students come from socially and economically backward strata of the society. They do not have any domestic support or cannot afford outside tuitions. The College, therefore, makes sure that these students get every kind of academic support on the campus. We have, therefore, incorporated the following strategies for complete teaching and learning.

- The maximum emphasis is on classroom teaching.
- Teachers take extra efforts to see that all students attend the classes. The attendance is, therefore, satisfactory in all the classes.
- Immediate attention is provided in the cases of absenteeism, by contacting the students, their parents, guardians, etc.
- In those cases, where the absence is due to medical reasons, the students are told to submit medical certificates.
- Besides verbal teaching, exhaustive study materials along with reference books are provided to students.



- Complicated part of the syllabus is re-taught and revised as per the students' requirements.
- If required "one-to-one" (micro teaching) teaching method is also used.
- Revision lectures are organized before every examination.
- Relevant questions are provided at the end of every topic/lesson.
- Mock examinations are conducted by some departments, at the end of each term, before the actual examinations.

Assessment strategies:

- As per the rule, two tutorial examinations are to be conducted per semester. More than two tutorial examinations are also conducted, for some needy students. Students are also made aware of the mistakes that they have committed while attempting the questions. Tips are provided about writing correct answers. They are then made to attempt reexamination.
- Teachers use projects as an assessment method in almost all subjects. These projects are treated as tutorials.
- For some subjects oral examinations are conducted.
- Some departments, such as, Psychology, Geography, Drawing and Painting, Music, BCA, Vocational Computer Application, and Office Management conduct practical examinations.
- Bridge and remedial courses are conducted for the students.

2.6.4 What are the measures / initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the Social and economic relevance (student placement, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

To enhance the Social and economic relevance of the courses offered, the Institution supports following activities:

- To develop/inject entrepreneurship among students, an annual exhibition is
 organized. Regular students as well as past students participate in the
 exhibition. Students sell items made by themselves, such as, paintings,
 painted dress material, decoration items, musical CDs, etc. Also, they do
 trading of items such as imitation jewelry, food items, books, etc. Many
 students get experience of trading and business practices through this
 exhibition.
- The students of the Department of Commerce participate in the virtual stock exchange activity of the ICICI bank wherein they trade on the stock exchanges in a 7-day inter-colliegiate competition at State and National level
- Financial literacy and financial inclusion are the important slogans for development of the society. The students of economics try to spread this



message through performance of a "Mock Bank". The students play roles in the events expressing the need of the bank and explain the functions of bank by using simulation method. The observers appreciate the role play and simulation method used for effective communication of the topic.

- The students of the Department of Art and Painting enhance their artistic skills through such activities as: stage decoration, black-board writing, 'Rangoli' decoration, etc. in various programmes, including the Annual Social Gathering, regional Yuva Mahotsav, Departmental activities, etc.
- The Department of Art and Painting organizes an exhibition of posters and paintings made by the students.
- Opportunities are given to the students of the Department of Music to perform on the occasions of Thackarsey Day, Independence Day, Republic Day, etc. They present patriotic songs, classical songs and *bhajans*, etc.. These students give a cultural programme at Cipla Cancer Paliative Care Unit as a social service every year.
- The Department of Psychology runs a counseling centre for students. The students of the Department of Psychology are encouraged to participate and understand the counseling process and its social need.
- The Department of Marathi organizes workshops on Marathi 'shuddhlekhan' (orthography), Ancoring, and Poetry, etc. which improves the language of the students.
- The Department of Geography organizes a Geo-fest for students and their parents. Students display various aspects of geography through models, maps, etc. It creates awareness about environmental and geographical phenomena.
- The College has a Placement Cell since 2002. The Institution has a long history and good reputation in the country. Every year, many good companies, therefore, approach the College for hiring students through campus interviews. Many of our students get placement after graduation.

For better placement of the students in companies, College organizes lectures for the students to improve communication skills. Also guidance is provided about interview techniques.



A training workshop was organized for the students to enhance their employability, in collaboration with TCS. Many students participated and benefited from this activity.

- To develop entrepreneurship skills, College organizes many workshops.
 Aptitude Tests are conducted for the students to understand their inclination in business endeavour.
- Information about MBA, MCA, B. Ed. entrance examinations and competitive examinations like MPSC, UPSC, civil services and banking is provided to the students. The College displays articles relating to Competitive Examinations, Interview Techniques, and Group Discussions on notice boards. Requirements from news-paper advertisement are displayed on notice board and students are made aware about the job opportunities.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

- Every Department does result analysis of its subjects.
- All the teachers discuss about the results in the Staff Meeting.
- The results are discussed in detail and suggestions are given for improvement, such as, remedial teaching, personal academic counseling, and micro teaching.

2.6.6: How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcome?

Every department does result analysis of its subject.

For weak students extra coaching is provided on personnel level for improvement. Practice material and simplified study notes are provided for better learning outcome.

2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning?

Yes, every teacher goes through the results of internal tests of first term and identifies the students who require special attention and efforts. These students are given personal counseling and additional home work, and tests to improve their performance. In spite of these efforts, if any student fails in the external examination, remedial coaching is arranged for upgrading the knowledge of the subject.



Any other relevant information regarding Teaching Learning and Evaluation witch the College would like to include.

The students' parents, in many cases, are not highly educated. Most of the students face financial constraints in the family and they do not get support and motivation from the family to continue education. It is difficult for these students to do self-study as they do not get help of technology like computer and the internet in their homes. Hence, they attend classes regularly as they are totally dependent on the teachers and their teaching. While teaching, teachers keep the students' background in mind and help them. They give emphasis on the classroom teaching and also support the students by giving notes, micro teaching, and guide them about the proper and suitable method of study. The teachers give emotional support to the students in their individual and family problems by counseling them. It helps us to build a good rapport between the students and teachers. They become facilitators and mentors for these students.

Some teachers have created groups on social media, but majority of students could not be a part of it as they do not have any access either to computer or to internet at home. Still teachers have good relationship with the students. This is a salient feature of our teaching —learning process.



CRITERION III RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION





CRITERION III- RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Introduction

Research provides the way out for developing creative and scientific attitude amongst the students. The College undertakes departmental and interdisciplinary research projects to create awareness about the social issues. This also helps to teach the methodology of collection of data, analysis and interpretation of data.

The teaching staff is involved in research activities through participation in seminars and conferences, presenting and publishing research articles in conference proceedings as well as in research journals, undertaking minor, major and Ph. D. research studies and also by giving guidance to M. Phil. and Ph. D. students as recognized guides of the SNDT Women's University and other Universities.

The teaching staff provides consultancy services to society. The psychological and career guidance is provided to the needy students from the College through the counseling cell. As a social service, consultancy for psychological and career guidance is also given to outside students. Consultancy for analysis of data collected for research is provided through collaborations with Asian Development Bank and CBRTI, Pune.

The N.S.S., N.C.C. and the other Departments actively participate in extension activities. Women Empowerment, Environmental Protection, Save Girl Child, Cancer Awareness, Nutrition and Health Awareness are the themes chosen by the College. Street plays, street rallies, poster exhibitions, workshops, tree plantation programmes, surveys, and annual special camps are the activities organized to reach to the society. These activities are also helpful to create awareness about the social issues amongst the students and to enhance their own creativity and competence.

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1. Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

Our College is for undergraduate students, so the College does not have a recognized research center of its own; however, the institution has the recognized center of the constituent university (SNDT Women's University) called PGSR (Post Graduate Studies and Research) Center in the same campus. Our students go for post graduate studies to the PGSR center.



Some of our faculty members are recognized guides for M. Phil. and Ph. D. programmes of the SNDT Women's University as well as for other universities.

3.1.2. Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

> Composition of Research Committee:

Research Committee of our college was established in 2009-10. The Principal is the chairperson of this committee. The members of this committee are recognized Ph. D. guides. The committee monitors and addresses the issues related to research. Its composition for the year 2013-14 was as follows:

> Recommendations:

In order to promote research activities in the College, research committee puts forth the following suggestions:

- Faculty members should register for doctoral research.
- They should avail themselves of FIP for pursuing doctoral research.
- Faculty members should participate in seminars and conferences.
- They should publish their papers in research journals.
- They should undertake departmental research under the UGC XII plan.
- Faculty members should apply to the UGC for undertaking major and minor research.

> Impact of recommendations

These suggestions were implemented and as a result of which many staff members participated in different seminars and conferences. Fifteen staff members published their research papers in research journals or conference proceedings during 2009-13. Two staff members were availed with the facility of Faculty Improvement Programme (FIP) for completing Ph. D. during the last five years.

3.1.3. What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects? The College comes under 2(f) and 12(B) status of the UGC. Therefore, teachers can apply directly to the UGC for research projects.



Various measures are taken by the College to facilitate smooth progress of research.

§ Autonomy to the principal investigator

The complete autonomy is given to the Principal investigator while undertaking research.

§ Timely availability or release of resources

All the necessary resources like funds, study material are made available to the researcher on time.

§ Adequate infrastructure and human resources

The College has a well-equipped computer laboratory with internet facility. The staff members of the central library and the College office extend their cooperation to the researchers.

§ Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave, etc., to teachers

About thirty percent of our permanent staff members are recognized research guides. There are about twenty students registered for Ph. D. under them during last four years. However, the College being an Undergraduate College, teachers do not get remission in their regular workload.

Leave under FIP is sanctioned to teachers pursuing Ph.D. Two teachers have availed themselves of this facility during the last five years.

Duty leave is sanctioned for participation in conferences, workshops, etc.

§ Support in terms of technology and information needs

The College has a well-equipped computer laboratory having internet facility. This laboratory can be used for research by the staff and the students, free of cost. Our central library is equipped with a huge number of books. Researchers can access a number of e- journals and e-books through the library. Inter library loan facility is also available to the researchers.

§ facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities

On verification of vouchers, the Statutory auditor of the College provides audited statements and utilization certificate to the researchers. The certified copies are forwarded to the funding authorities through the proper channel.

§ Any other

3.1.4. What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students? Scientific temper -

While teaching students in the class, teachers insist on rational and scientific thinking to be followed in day-to-day behavior. Ours is a women's College, so we organize a number of lectures for our students, which provide a scientific outlook towards their physical and psychological make-up. Similarly, programmes by Andhashraddha Nirmoolan Samitee are held in the College,



for example, along with a lecture by the late Dr. Narendra Dabholkar on 17/9/2010, group discussion was held for the College students in this regard. In order to develop research culture and aptitude, students are encouraged to take up small scale research projects (e.g. B.A. II and III – Psychology, B.A. III - Marathi, department of Commerce, etc.) For example,

- I) B.A.-II (Psychology) Sem. III and IV students undertake projects for the course on Applied Statistics and research methods every year since the last 5 years (i.e. since 2009)
- II) B.A.-III (Psychology) Sem. VI students undertake projects for the course-Health psychology
- III) B.A.-II (Marathi) Sem. III students prepare projects for the course Samasyapradhan Stree Sahitya
- IV) B.A.III (Marathi) Sem.V and VI students prepare projects for the course *Marathi Vanmayacha Itihas*. B.A. III (Economics) Sem. V and VI students prepare projects for the course Research Methodology and Statistics.
- B.Com. III students prepare questionnaires and collect data for various surveys.
- BVA Final year students take up research projects and submit their dissertations.

The students of BCA sem. VI carry out research project and submit their dissertation to the University.

Guiding student research

There are 6 recognized research guides as on today. There was one more research guide (Dr. Rewa Kulkarni) in 2009-10 who retired in 2011.

Dr. Manasee Rajhans guided a student of B.A. II, Charuta Puranik, for her research paper on 'Male-Female Differences on Gratitude and Helping Attitude' which she presented in Marathi Manashastra Parishad, a State Level Conference held in January, 2014 at Sangameshwar College, Solapur.

The Principal, Dr. G. Y. Shitole, conducted a workshop on 'Writing Research Proposals' in March 2014.

The staff members are encouraged to participate in workshops on research methodology. Six staff members participated in such workshops during the last five years. Four staff members worked as experts in workshops on research methodology. Three staff members have taught this course at post-graduate level.

Our College being an Arts and Commerce College, we have experts in the following areas: Commerce, Economics, Psychology, and Visual Arts.

The prioritized research areas of our College include Banking and Finance, Foreign Direct Investment, International Trade, Marketing and Micro Finance, Ethics in Education, Self Help Groups, Statistical Analysis, Women Empowerment, Educational Psychology, etc.

3.1.9. What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?

The College does not have the provision for sabbatical leave system, so no staff member from the College has utilized Sabbatical Leave; however, about 10 per cent of our faculty have availed themselves of the facility of FIP. In order to pursue doctoral research, Mrs. Anjali Kadam (Economics) availed leave under the UGC FIP from 17 December 2008 to 16 December 2011 and Miss Mrinalini Ghatage (English) availed herself of the leave under the UGC FIP from 21 January 2010 to 22 October 2012.

3.1.10. Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness/advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land) Various Departments of our College such as the N.S.S., Psychology, Economics, Commerce, Computer Applications, and Department of Drawing and Painting, etc., conducted small scale surveys. Surveys by N.S.S.



Department are especially conducted on health issues of women. The findings of these surveys are discussed with students.

Researchers are encouraged to publish their research papers in journals and to write articles in magazines and newspapers; so that students as well as community become aware of the research. For example, findings of research by Dr. Rajhans have been published in Maharashtra Times. Finding of research by Mrs. Anjali Kadam have been published in the periodical Yashmanthan.

Five percent of the total budget is earmarked for research.

Major Heads of Expenditure are Books and Journals, Honorarium to Project Fellow, Contingency, Hiring Services and Travel Expenses

Our faculty applies to the UGC for research projects. They get funding from the UGC. The College does not provide seed money to the faculty. However, small scale departmental research projects are partially funded through the budgets of the departments.

3.2.3. What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

Ours is an Under Graduate College. Research carried out by students is mainly in the form of projects. The last year students of BVA and BCA submitted their dissertation as a part of their curriculum. Hence, financial support is not provided to the students by the College.

3.2.4. How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

Staff members of the departments of Commerce and English undertake and complete interdisciplinary research projects. (Refer to 3.2.7 for details). The Syllabus of English for B.Com.III includes topics such as preparation of questionnaire and report writing. B.Com. students also have to learn a paper called Industrial Statistics. These students prepare questionnaires, collect data,



analyse it statistically and write reports. In this manner, students of the Department of Commerce along with the Department of English successfully completed Inter disciplinary projects.

No significant challenge has been faced so far.

3.2.5. How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

Institution provides computer terminals as well as open and free access to internet in predetermined slots for the students and researchers. The central library is very well- equipped with books and e-journals. Researchers utilize these facilities optimally.

3.2.6. Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facility? If 'yes' give details.

The institution has not received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facility. However, institutions like Business Ethics Forum, CBRTI have provided funding for conducting surveys.

The College encourages the faculty members to establish good relationship with institutes and industries. Many departments arrange study visits to



Institutes like Bank of Maharashtra ((Overseas Branch), SBI, Sahakarnagar Branch, Katraj Milk dairy Pune, Janaseva Shakari Bank, etc.

Students attend annual general meeting of companies like Sahyadri Industry, Akurdi, Raj Indusries, Sudarshan Chemicals, Kirloskar Brothers, Kalyani Investments, etc.

Indian Accounting Association holds National Accounting Talent Search examination in our College every year. Industries like TCS, GOOGLE, e-Clerk, WNS, conduct training programmes for our students and provide assistance in placements.

3.5.2. What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

The College encourages and permits its faculty members to provide consultancy to other Universities and Institutions.

The College will start its fully functioning website soon and will publicize available expertise and resources on it.

The College has a separate Psychology Counseling cell. At the time of the welcome speech to the First year students' information about this service is provided. The College provides this service free of cost.

3.5.3. How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

Through the encouragement provided by the institution, some of our staff members have been providing consultancy services to the community. Following faculty members provide consultancy services.

- Dr. Madhavi Kulkarni (Vice-Principal) has provides academic consultancy to carry out statistical analysis consultancy for a number of institutions such as Shriram Foundary, Oriental Rubber, Top Gear Transmissions, Asian Development Bank, CBRTI, Garware Wall-Ropes industry, etc.
- Mr. Kishor Bhide, Associate Professor English, is consulted for documentation and translation of Government Resolutions.
- Dr. Madhura Joshi, Mrs.Vasanti Joshi and Dr. Smita Deshpande provide consultancy to develop new courses at YCMOU and St. Mira's College, Pune. Dr. (CA) Smita Deshpande also provides consultancy for taxation.
- Dr. Manasee Rajhans provides consultancy to the psychologically needy through counseling.
- Many staff members have delivered lectures at various places and thereby they have helped the society by providing expert guidance.

3.5.5. What is the policy of the institution in sharing the income generated through consultancy (staff involved: Institution) and its use for institutional development?

The policy of the College is to deposit the balance amount to the corpus fund of the College after meeting all expenses.

In the consultancy projects taken up by Dr. Madhavi Kulkarni and Mr. Kishor Bhide, eighty-five percent of the consultancy charges were utilized for Coordination, Data entry, Statistical Analysis and Report writing. Ten percent of charges were used for administration. Surplus five percent amount was deposited to the corpus fund of the College, with which a digital camera was purchased for College use.

3.6. Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR) 3.6.1. How does the institution promote institution-neighbourhood-community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

The College has two very strong units namely N.S.S. and N.C.C., which are actively engaged in social service. These departments take up various activities throughout the year that promote neighbourhood- community network. These activities contribute to good citizenship and holistic development of students. N.S.S. department consists of about 300 volunteers from the College. Some of the activities held every year by the N.S.S. department, include-:

Seven- day Residential Camp in a village near Pune. The programmes in the Camp are planned according to the themes decided every year.



Programmes for creating awareness about health, hygiene, education, environment conservation, women's Empowerment, etc. are generally taken up in the Camp. Street plays, lectures, and fun games are conducted for the villagers in order to educate them.

- ➤ Blood donation camp is organized every year.
- The students of N.S.S. Department participate in various camps and workshops organized by other colleges and universities.
- Motivational lectures and workshops are organized for the N.S.S. students in the College.

The department of N.C.C. consists of about 100 cadets. It regularly conducts activities like social awareness rallies and tree plantation.

3.6.2. What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The Programme Officers of the departments of N.S.S. and N.C.C. plan yearly activities motivate students to participate in them, and keep yearly records of all students who participate in them. Reports based on these records are sent to the SNDT Women's University. The N.S.S. volunteers are provided diaries which are useful to know their involvement in various activities. Badges are provided to the N.S.S. volunteers to increase their motivation. The N.S.S. and N.C.C. students are given the incentive of marks (up to 10) in the graduation year as an encouragement for participation in social work activities.

3.6.3. How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

Every year feedback is sought from the last, that is (graduation), year students with the help of an exit form. The College also holds alumni and parents' meetings, in which they are encouraged to put forth their suggestions for improving College performance.

3.6.4. How does the institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students.

Through the activities of N.S.S. and N.C.C. the extension and outreach programmes are organized.

Budgetary details for the last 4 years for extension and outreach programmes are as follows.

The N.S.S. Department of the SNDT Women's University sanctions the amount of R.225/-per N.S.S. volunteer for conducting regular activities throughout the year. The Department also sanctions Rs.450/- per volunteer to



organize residential camp. The College plans the activities and meets the expenses through the sanctioned amount.

The N.C.C. cadets of our College are attached to the 2 Maharashtra Girls Battalion. All the expenses of the Department of N.C.C. are borne by the Battalion, so for N.C.C. no separate budgetary provision is made.

3.6.5. How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in N.S.S., N.C.C., YRC and other National/ International agencies?

At the time of the entry level (i.e. at the first year level) to the College, the Principal and the staff members inform students about various extension activities, especially of the N.S.S. and N.C.C. Departments. N.S.S. and N.C.C. are very important social service activities. They help towards overall personality development of students. The first year students can voluntarily opt for either N.S.S. or N.C.C. as per their interest. They are appealed to participate wholeheartedly in these activities.

The students, who complete two-hundred and forty hours of social service within two academic years, get ten marks as an incentive at their graduation level. The N.S.S. programme officers organize different extension activities.



All staff members extend their cooperation to N.S.S. programme officers in organizing extension activities.

Through N.C.C. activity, students are encouraged to develop themselves physically as well as mentally. Our College has a separate N.C.C. platoon attached to 2 Maharashtra Girls battalion, Pune. One staff member, Lt. Kashifa Inamdar is in-charge of the N.C.C. unit. Weekly training sessions are held at the College campus or at the battalion.

The College encourages the staff members to undergo special training for N.S.S. and N.C.C. activities .Every year a separate team of staff members is deputed for this N.C.C. activity.

3.6.6. Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the college to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society?

Every year residential Camp is organized by the N.S.S. Department in the rural area surrounding Pune city. The N.S.S. volunteer conduct surveys regarding women's and children's issues residing in those areas. An attempt is made to provide some solution to the problems of children and women.

Activities like social awareness and educational programmes are also conducted every year.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

Introduction

The College strives hard to augment infrastructure in order to provide maximum facilities to the students and enrich the teaching-learning environment.

Our infrastructure includes facilities like, the well-equipped classrooms, staff room, administrative office, Principal's Office, Library, Ladies Room, Seminar Hall and well-equipped Computer Laboratories. Adequate parking facility is provided to the staff and students.

Infrastructural facilities are being utilized optimally and augmented from time to time. The College has employed staff for maintenance of infrastructure and to keep the campus clean and green. Adequate budget is allocated for maintenance of infrastructure.

The University Branch library is well-equipped with computers, scanner, etc. Licensed copy of library software SLIM 21, N-list and EBSCO database links are available. Adequate number of books, CDs, DVDs, and Journals are available in the library.

There are adequate number of computers, LAN and internet connectivity printers and scanner along with LCD projectors and photocopying machine. Safe drinking water is supplied to the College. Electricity backup for the computer laboratory is ensured by providing a battery backup. The College shares the Hostel Facility on the campus which houses around hundred and forty students of our College. A common Canteen facility is made available to the staff and students at subsidized rate. Two play grounds are available within the campus even though the College is situated in the central place of the city.

4.1. Physical facilities

4.1.1. What is the policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitates effective teaching and learning?

The College has developed two computer laboratories with internet facility and with battery back-up.

The College has a plan to establish a Language Laboratory.

The College maintains its infrastructure by carrying out repairs and renovations.

Every six months, the College is washed and cleaned thoroughly. Periodically, curtains and carpets are changed. The College has a contract with a pest-control agency for periodical fuming and pest-control treatment. The College maintains its type writers, computers, and printers by calling in mechanics as and when necessary by providing Annual Maintenance Contracts.



The College gets musical instruments, instruments in Geography and Psychology laboratories repaired. The instruments beyond repair are replaced from time to time. Furniture, such as tables, chairs, cupboards, fans, tubelights, window-panes, glass-shutters of cupboards and notice-boards, blackboards, etc., are repaired as and when necessary.

The College office maintains an up-to-date record of the students and employees. The College discards obsolete office records, furniture, instruments and e-waste.

The College ensures the optimum utilization of its infrastructure facilities. The College functions in two shifts. Hence, from 7:30 a.m. to about 6:30 p.m. the classrooms are used by the Junior wing, the Senior wing. It conducts additional sessions for 'Computer for All' programme as well.

During vacations or public holidays, class rooms are rented out for competitive examinations such as UPSC, MPSC, Institute of Company Secretaries, National Open School, etc. It also helps to raise additional funds for the College. The College building is utilized for Government examinations, State Board examinations and Assembly and other local elections. It also makes the hall available on nominal charges for literary and cultural programmes of outside agencies, like Lion's Club, Education College to hold their Annual Social, for rehearsals of professional drama groups, etc. The College makes the playground available to organizations like Suvarnayuga Mandal for practice, and to various agencies for holding exhibitions.

4.1.2. Detail the facilities available for

a. Curricular and co-curricular activities-

There are forty seven classrooms in the College which are used for the teaching -learning process as well as for engaging tutorials.

There is one technologically enabled learning space, which is also used as a Seminar Hall. It is an audio-visual hall, which has the capacity of about hundred people. It has a stage so it is also used as an auditorium for the Annual Social. Most of the departments have departmental libraries.

b. Extra-curricular activities:

There are two playgrounds. These grounds are used for playing many outdoor games such as Kho-Kho, Basket Ball, Langadi, Throw Ball, Volley Ball, etc. For indoor games like Boxing, Badminton facilities are outsourced by the College. Funds are made available for appointing coaches for training the students. There is also a Sports Room in which the sports equipments are kept. Room No. 12 is allocated to the National Service Scheme. Rooms in Students' Home building are allocated for the National Cadet Corp. Seminar Hall, which has audio-visual facility and open stage are used for cultural activities. The PGSR Hall as well as Tarapore Hall is available at request, whenever necessary.

4.1.3. How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/ augmented and amount spent during the last four years (enclose the master plan of the institution/ campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions, if any).

The College conducts four programmes (B.A., B. Com., BVA in Marathi and English Mediums, and BCA in English Medium) and has sufficient number of classrooms needed to run these courses. The College makes its building available on rent for educational purposes.

4.1.4. How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

Till date there have been only visually impaired students. The staff and the students help the physically disabled students.

- Recreational Facilities, Gymnasium, and Yoga center: For recreation of the students a common-room with a TV set, Chess Board, Carom Board, etc., have been made available so as to make the students feel that they are at home. The hostel also celebrates Ganpati Festival, Navaratri Festival, Hostel Day, etc. every year.
- Computer facility including access to internet in Hostel: Nil
- Facilities for Medical emergencies: The hostel provides medical facilities to the inmates. On Mondays and Thursdays the doctor is available between 3.00 p.m. and 5.00 p.m. Similarly, in emergency the doctor is available on call round the clock, and, if necessary, students are taken to hospital.
- Library facility in the Hostel: Nil
- ➤ Internet and Wi-Fi facility : Nil
- Recreational facility-common room with audio-visual equipments
- Available residential facility for Staff: Residential facility is available for one Superintendent and one Assistant. Two guest rooms are available, which can accommodate four people.
- ➤ Constant supply of safe drinking water: Yes, four aqua guards and two coolers ensure constant supply of safe drinking water.
- Security: SNDT Pune campus has its security in place. In addition to that one independent watchman is available, and four maidservants and a twenty-four-hour lady attendant are available in the hostel.

4.1.6. What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

Provision for First Aid is made available with a well-equipped 'First Aid Kit' kept in the staff room, for medical emergencies.

Every year the first year students undergo a medical check-up by a team of Doctors from a nearby hospital. Being a Girls' college, a special arrangement is made for a gynecological check-up.

Sometimes special lectures are arranged for the benefit of students as well as staff, such as awareness of cancer by Dr. Shona Nag on 4th February, 2014.

4.1.7. Give details of the common facilities available on campus: Space for special units like IQAC:

There is a well-equipped room with the internet facility for the IQAC.

Grievance redressal unit: The Grievance Redressal Unit for the students is available in the College. It deals with the problems of the students.

Constitution of the unit is as follows: the Principal, the Vice-Principal, the teacher in-charge of Students' Council, the General Secretary of the College as a students' representative.



Women's Cell: Being women's college, there is no separate women's cell. Counseling and Career Guidance: The Department of Psychology runs the Counseling Cell in the department itself.

Placement Unit: There is a Placement Unit run by the College. The students are given guidance in relation to the interview techniques. Workshops on Group discussion are organized. They are oriented with the latest trends and requirements of the market. The unit makes the necessary arrangements to conduct the interviews.

Since ours is an undergraduate College, most of the students pursue post-graduation in the relevant subjects, so not many students avail themselves of the facility.

Health center: The College does not have a separate health center.

Ladies' Room: A specious room is made available to the students as Ladies' Room where students can relax and have their tiffin. It has all the necessary facilities like independent wash rooms, mirror, curtains, etc.

Canteen: Canteen facility is available. Snacks and meals are provided from morning 7 am till evening 6.30 pm. at subsidized rates. Hygiene and nutritional values are maintained.

Recreational spaces for staff and students: Two playgrounds, one at the front gate and another in front of the new hostel are provided where Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, Basketball, Volleyball, and Throw-Ball are played. They are well maintained by the maintenance staff. Funds are appropriately allocated for sports in the Annual Budget. On an annual basis, coaches are appointed for all the above sports. All equipments for sports are available in the Sports Room.

The Teaching and the Non Teaching Staff of the campus get together at the Visitors' Shade, once in a year for the 'SatyaNarayan Pooja' and Lunch. The non-teaching staff organises this event.

Safe drinking water facility: Direct drinking water connections are provided by the Pune Municipal Corporation. Three water tanks are situated in the campus. Half yearly these tanks are cleaned. In the College building, three Aqua-guard water purifiers and coolers are available.

Auditorium: The Students' Home is available for the recreation purpose. The PGSR Hall with the capacity of 200 and Tarapore Hall having the capacity of 400 people are available for the various programmes such as Regional Yuva Mahotsav, N.S.S. programmes, and the programmes conducted in collaboration with the University. These halls are available on request.

Any other:

Security- Twenty-four-hour security is provided in the campus. About twelve security guards keep patrolling throughout the campus: 2 to 3 are at the front gate, 2 to 3 are at the back gate, 2 to 3 are near Students' Home and the rest keep patrolling around the campus. Being the Women's college, women security guards are also recruited. Four CCTV cameras are installed, two at



the front gate (since 2012), and two at the guest house (since 2012) for additional security measure. Setting up of CCTV cameras in the College is in process.

- ➤ Parking Space- Parking space is provided to the students, teachers, office staff as well as visitors for the two-wheeler and the four-wheeler vehicles.
- ➤ Visitors' Shade- A Visitors' Shade is provided in front of the SNDT Arts and Commerce College for the visitors. Mainly the hostelite students are benefitted by this facility. Exhibition-cum-sale, Satyanarayan Pooja, Poster Exhibition are arranged in the shade.

Being a constituent College, we use central library facility provided by the University. The University library has a library committee as specified by the Maharashtra Universities Act (1994) chapter IX. The members of the committee are as follows:

- ➤ The Vice Chancellor- Chairperson;
- ➤ Three Deans of faculties, nominated by the Vice Chancellor;
- ➤ Three Heads of the University, Institutions, or Departments, nominated by the Vice Chancellor;
- Two teachers, nominated by the Academic Council, from the list of its members;
- ➤ The Registrar;
- > The Librarian- Secretary

Apart from the statutory library committee, two other advisory bodies are appointed to manage two important initiatives, namely, the archives, and the national information dissemination cell.

Every year the library conducts orientation session for First Year students to acquaint them with the sections, searching of books and issuing/ renewing of books, etc.

A special session is conducted to make its users aware of the procedure of accessing the e-resources. User-ids and passwords are handed over to them.

* User Orientation and awareness

Every year the orientation of the first year students of each programme is conducted. They are shown all the sections of the library and are given information of searching the catalogues. They are also motivated to use the OPAC facility.

* Assistance in searching Databases

This is available since 2012. The Library conducted 2 programmes on 'Searching the Net' for research students and the staff. Dr Shubhada Nagarkar explained to them the use of Google Advance and Google Scholar and the library staff illustrated the use of online databases in the library. Both these programmes were appreciated by the teachers and the researchers who attended. Starting in the year 2012 the library also conducted Departmental Quality Assurance Cell (DQAC) meetings for the improvement of library services. The library staff along with teaching staff representative and one student member discusses issues in the library.

The library staff has also started a project to find out the reading habits of the students on the campus. A questionnaire was prepared and distributed to students. Data collection will continue in the academic year 2015-16 and the analysis of this data will be done.

* INFLIBNET/ IUC facilities: This facility is available from 2012.

Special Features of the Library:

For the past 20 years, The SNDT Women's University Branch Library, Pune has been conducting an annual 'Granthotsav'. This programme is mainly meant for the students and other readers. The aim is to popularise reading and the use of the library. The programme includes various competitions like book titles, Crossword, Quiz, Memory Game, Slogan, Dumb Charades and Essay, etc. It is followed by book exhibition cum sale



and a lecture by a well known personality. During the past years, prominent personalities like Dr. Jayant Naralikar, Dr. Mohan Agashe, Dr. Shreeram Lagoo, Justice B. N. Deshmukh, Shri. Avinash Dharmadhikari, Shri. AnilAvachat, Shri. Sudhir Gadgil, Smt. Sumitra Bhave, Shri. Deepak Shikarpur, Dr. Narendra Jadhav, Smt. Sindhutai Sapkal, Smt. Kirti Shiledar, etc. have come and talked to the students about their work and how reading helped them to shape their lives and their careers.

- ➤ Besides the exhibition and sale held during the Granthotsav, the library puts up regular displays of books, articles and newspaper clippings on various topics in addition to the display of new books.
- Library also exhibits the 'old edition books sale' every year. Many students avail of this and purchase books at low price.
- The Music department students make good use of the AV room facilities. Both teachers and groups of students used the services regularly. Literature students in English and Marathi also made good use of the AV facilities, to view films based on literary texts.







4.2.7. Enumerate on the support provided by the Library staff to the students and teachers of the college.

Library staff provides the support to students and teachers in the following way:

- Information literacy programmes: The University library conducts information literacy and orientation programmes to develop skills in library use, especially in the use of electronic resources.
- Reference services are provided as and when asked for.
- ➤ Issue and return of books for the whole day, facility of renewal of issued books is given to faculty and students.
- Library offers computer facilities and access to seventeen data bases at present. For the teachers and research students workshops were held on 'searching the databases' and on 'advanced Google search'.

4.2.8. What are the special facilities offered by the library to the visually/physically challenged persons? Give details.

- For the physically challenged, we have ramps for their mobility to two sections of the library.
- ➤ For the visually disabled we have a few text books in Braille. For their benefit, a separate Audio Visual Room is created.



4.2.9. Does the library get the feedback from its users? If yes, how is it analyzed and used for improving the library services. (What strategies are deployed by the library to collect feedback from users? How is the feedback analyzed and used for further improvement of the library services?)

Every year a feedback is taken from students about the services and facilities of the library. This feedback is analysed by the library staff and the required actions are taken to improve the services. Informal interviews will also be conducted.

Yes, most of the library functions are user friendly. In case a user faces any difficulty, library staff provides the required help.

4.3.2. Details on the computer and internet facility made available to the faculty and students on the campus and off the campus.

Internet facility (10.00 am to 11.30 am and 4.00 pm to 5.00 pm everyday) is made available to the staff as well as to the students. One computer is now allocated to the staff members along with internet facility.

4.3.3. What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

At present the number of computers is sufficient to manage the students' strength. As a result, there are no spare computers, which could be used to develop computer-aided learning packages.

From now on, the College would endeavor to develop such packages.

4.3.4. Provide details on the provision made in the annual budget for procurement, up gradation, deployment and maintenance of the computers and their accessories in the institution.



Every year, the College has a provision for procurement of new instruments, Psychological tests available in market. Internet facility was available in the College but was recently upgraded by subscribing to new VPN connections. It helped to enhance the speed of internet facility. The computer laboratory and allied equipment is maintained in good state by having Annual Maintenance Contract with M/s. Symtron Services.

The details of these are provided in Annual Budget attached as an Annexure.

4.3.5. How the institution does facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer aided teaching learning materials by its staff and students?

For the development and use of computer aided teaching learning materials by its staff, following measures have been taken:

- > Two training courses were organized, the details of which are given below:
 - a. 16 July to 21 July 2012, an ICT Workshop was organized in collaboration with the SNDT Women' University, Mumbai.
 - b. A five-day workshop was organized from 24 March to 29 March 2014, on using Advanced Computer Techniques in Teaching.
- As mentioned in 4.3.2, the Internet facility is made available every day from 10.00am to 11.30 am and 4.00 pm to 5.00 pm to the staff as well as to the students. This can be used by them for their personal enrichment and research work.
- ➤ Departmental projects are given to the students of various courses like English, Geography, and Psychology, etc. Students make maximum use of internet facility to get the information on relevant subjects.

4.3.6. Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to online teaching learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classroom/learning spaces, etc.) by the institution placing the student at the centre of teaching learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

All the students avail themselves of the IT resources through the programme 'Computer for All' as well as using Internet Facility. As a method of independent learning, the students are given topics for the presentations and seminars, which they prepare on their own. Teachers act as only a facilitator. The students of BCA carry out live project work, in which extensive use of IT resources is made. Summer vacation batches are conducted for Junior Wing students to train them in MS Office and DTP software. This orients the students towards programmes conducted by senior wing.

The teacher plays a role of facilitator in the following activities:



- Computer-Fest- students prepare quizzes, games related to the computer field.
- ➤ Geo-fest- Geography students are given guidance by computer faculty to collect information and prepare presentations or charts on their topics.
- Student Participation in various competitions- Students of the department of BCA secured first and Second prizes in the World Water Pollution Competition held by Shashwat Group in 2013-14.
- To improve English, the teachers take special efforts. A group is formed on a social media i.e.facebook where the information about the use and the usage of language is shared. The students are the members of the group.
- ➤ Commerce students of the College are assisted in practical working with tally software.

4.3.7. Does the institution avail of the National Knowledge Network connectivity directly or through the affiliating university? If so, what are the services availed of?

The College does not avail itself of the National Knowledge Network connectivity.

4.4. Maintenance of Campus Facilities

The College ensures optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for building repair and maintenance, buying new furniture and lab equipment as and when necessary. It maintains the computers in good state of working by scraping the old machines and purchasing new ones.

Building maintenance and wash- room repairs are monitored by Mr. Solanki, Building Supervisor, who is deputed by the University to look after the Pune Campus. Electrical repairs are carried out with the help of M/s Jayant Electricals. Benches are replenished from time to time. Stage in Seminar Hall was renovated and carpeted in August 2013 at the time of hosting Regional Yuva Mahotsav. LCD projector was permanently fixed in the Hall at that time.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

Introduction:

The College is a constituent college of the SNDT Women's University. Keeping in mind the Vision and Mission of the University, the students are supported and encouraged to participate in many Co-curricular as well as Extra-curricular activities.

Separate prospectuses are printed for the B. A., B. Com., BVA, and BCA programmes. Each prospectus contains the introduction of the University and the College, the rules regarding granting of the term and college timings. Each prospectus includes the structures and the medium(s) of instruction, rules regarding admission and eligibility criteria of the programme.

The College motivates the students to participate in various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities like N.S.S., N.C.C., and Sports. Three N.S.S. POs organize N.S.S. activities for 300 N.S.S. volunteers. A Separate N.C.C. platoon headed by an Associate N.C.C. Officer is a unique feature of the College. Students participate in different sports and games, and also in adventure sports.

The College publishes the annual Magazine, *Shabdotsav*, which contains articles and poems written by the students. The cover page of the magazine is always designed by the students of BVA. The students are encouraged to get the advertisements for the magazine and they get 10% commission.

A Counseling Cell, run by the Department of Psychology, is available in the campus for all the students for their personal as well as career guidance. The Alumni Association of the College conducts career related exhibition and exhibition —cum-sale for the students.

The College conducts both academic and extra-curricular activities for the overall growth and progression of students. The College takes efforts to make the students strong mentally and also physically to fulfill the motto of the University 'empowerment of women through higher education'.

5.1. Student Mentoring and Support

5.1.1. Does the institution publish its updated prospectus/handbook annually? If 'yes', what is the information provided to students through these documents and how does the institution ensure its commitment and accountability?

Yes, the College publishes Prospectuses every year. The prospectus is sold at the time of admission. In addition to this, the diaries provided by the University are distributed among the students. The content of these are as follows:



A. Prospectus:

Separate prospectuses are printed for the B.A., B.Com., BVA, and BCA programmes. The Prospectus for the B.A., B.Com., and BVA are in Marathi, and the Prospectus for the BCA programme is in English. The prospectus contains the following things:

- The name and the logo of the University, postal address, web site, and phone numbers.
- The names of the Vice-Chancellor, Principal, and Vice Principal.
- Information about the history of the University and the College
- ➤ On the front page, a photograph of the College, the name, e-mail IDs, and on the back page the University song, and the National Anthem are printed.
- For transparency and accountability, name of the Publisher and the price of the prospectus are given.
- A list of programmes available to the students, their structures and the medium(s) of instruction, rules regarding admission and eligibility criteria.
- ➤ Information of the nature of the examination, and internal assessment scheme.
- The rules regarding granting of the term and college timings.
- The fee-structure and the refund of the fees admissible, in case of cancellation.
- Information of scholarships, free-ships, awards, , etc..
- Information regarding support services, such as library, hostel, etc.
- ➤ Information about various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities normally carried out in the College.
- The rules regarding the conduct of students in the College
- The form regarding anti-ragging as per the Government Notification is a part of the prospectus.

B. Diary

The University diary begins with a message of the Honorable Vice-Chancellor. The information about the University, its administrative staff and the offices, four campuses, a list of conducted and affiliated colleges along with the contact details is given in the diary. It provides information about the faculty-wise courses. It presents information of the University Library system, Information about the Department of Students' Welfare, Physical Education, N.C.C., and N.S.S. It also includes major activities along with the academic calendar. As ours is a Women's University, to make the students aware of the Constitutional Provisions for Women, information is given in details. It also includes information of Salient features of important Social Legislation Relating to Women, 'Women in Panchayati Raj institutions', 'Pre-Conception



and Prenatal Diagnostics Techniques (Prohibition of Sex Selection) Act, 2003' and also 'Anti ragging Directive'.

Diaries are circulated among the admitted students.

Prospectus and diary are the first official documents, through which the University and the College reach to its stake holders. It is always observed that authentic and true information regarding admission procedure and fee structure is made available. Thus, commitment and accountability are maintained.

5.1.2. Scholarships and free-ships: its availability and timely disbursement

The College follows the different financial/incentive schemes offered by the Central and the State Governments. Government free-ships are now deposited into the students' accounts directly. In addition, at the University and the College level, freeships and financial aid in the form of awards are also made available out of the donations received for encouraging the students with high excellence and also for supporting the needy students. The disbursement of the amount is sometimes need based following rules and regulations. Some amount might be used by giving concession in the fees at the time of admission; some is disbursed at the time of Annual Social. The variety of scholarships and free-ships along with the number of beneficiaries are given below:

At University Level:

The University offers free-ship to the children of its employees working in the University itself or in any of the institutions conducted by it. However, during recent years no such claim has been made by the employees.

At College Level:

Every year students are given financial aid in the form of awards out of the donations received by the College. The number of beneficiaries and amount disbursed in last five years are given below:

5.1.4. What are the specific services/ facilities available for:

> Students for SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

The students from reservation category are given priority at the time of admission. Students from economically weaker sections are allowed to pay fees in installments and some are given concessions.

> Students with physical disabilities

In our college, a few physically disabled students take admission. Visually challenged students take admission to our college.

A separate teaching assistance is provided for such students. Considering the requirement, social workers help them to have audio material available. At the time of examination, special seating arrangement along with the writer is provided. Considering the need, classes from the top floor are shifted to the ground floor for their convenience.

Overseas students

The College used to provide Police Clearance to overseas students. However, as medium of instruction is basically Marathi, during the last five years there was no such student.



> Students to participate in various competitions/ National and International

The students are encouraged to participate in curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular competitions at College, Inter-collegiate level, Zonal Level, National, University and Inter-university level. A Few of our students have also participated in the singing competitions on T.V. musical show "Sa Re Ga Ma Pa". Entries to such competitions are generally sent through the College, guidance and preparations for competitions are provided and the teaching staff accompanies the participants for the competitions.

Medical assistance to students: Health Centre, Health Insurance, etc.
On behalf of the College, the Department of N.S.S. organizes Medical Check-up Camp every year in the month of January. A team of doctors carries out Dental, Eye and General Health check-up. This is organized for all the students of the first year degree courses.

The Department of N.S.S. organizes blood donation camp every year. On an average fifty bottles are collected in the camp. This number is less as the College has only girl students and most of them are either under weight or undernourished. The doctors guide them about the diet for improving hemoglobin level and general health.

Students of our College do participate in the adventure sports every year. As per the requirements we ensure that students are covered under the insurance plan. In the year 2013-14, the students participated in the long distance cycle rally, from Pune to Kanyakumari. The participants were provided with insurance coverage unde the scheme of mediclaim. The University does a group insurance of participants of sports competitions.

> Organizing coaching classes for competitive examinations

The Department of Career and Counseling, along with placement cell, organizes coaching classes for the students of the last year. In the year 2013-14, the Department of Languages organized coaching classes for M.P.S.C. for Compulsory Marathi paper. The duration was of three months. In all thirteen students were benefited. The Department of, Commerce and the Department of Social Sciences also organized contact lectures for competitive examinations.

The Placement Cell and other departments organized the following guest lecturers to give information about the competitive examinations:

> Skill development (Spoken English, computer literacy, etc.) Spoken English:

In our College for Commerce stream, we have classes for English as well as Marathi mediums. For Arts stream, medium of instruction is Marathi. In the University syllabus, for Marathi medium classes for B. A. and B. Com., Spoken English is included to cater to the need of the students. For the Arts, batches of twenty-five students each and for the Commerce, batches of thirty-five students each are made for convenience and also for the individual attention.

> Computer for All:

In case of students of Commerce with specialization of Computer Application and students of B.C.A. programme are well-versed with computer knowledge. For all other students, as per the Government Guidelines, the College arranges twenty-one day computer training for each academic year under the scheme of 'Computer for All'. The



components of three years syllabus is proposed by the University which includes introduction to MS-Office, Tally, Page maker, Photo shop, Internet, etc. The College has been running this scheme since last eight years.

> Support for "slow learners"

Majority of the students of this college do not carry excellent educational record. Many of them are the first generation learners. The survey carried out in the academic year 2013-14 reveals the fact that forty-two per cent mothers and twenty per cent fathers of the students enrolled for B. A. and B. Com. Programmes have not cleared Grade X examination. Naturally, these students totally depend for their studies on teachers. The teachers provide required support by taking extra efforts in the regular classes and by organizing remedial teaching to the concerned group of students. Needbased remedial lectures are also arranged to the repeater students.

> Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning / corporate/business house, etc..

- i. Field Visits and Study Tours are organized to give exposure to the students. The Department of Social Sciences and the Department of Fine Arts arrange study tours every year for the students of The Geography and BVA. The students of BVA visit different Art Galleries and exhibitions of the renowned artists. To study different land forms and to observe aspects of Human Geography study tours are organized every year for the students of Geography.
- ii. In the past five years, the students of Company Law and Secretarial Practice (C.L.S.P.) have attended Annual General Meetings of D.S.K. Constructions Ltd., Sahyadri Industries, Sudarshan Chemicles Ltd., Praj India Ltd., Kirloskar India, Kalyani Investments, etc. as observers.
- iii. In the year 2012-13, eight students with specialization in C.L.S.P. of the Department of Commerce have undergone On-Job Training.
- iv. For the students of Economics study visits are arranged to Bank of Maharashtra, Overseas Bank, Katraj Dairy, and State Bank of India.
- v. Students of the BCA programme and Vocational Computer Application participated in intercollegiate Web Designing Competition and won prizes.
- vi. The Department of Psychology encourages the students to present their papers in the seminars, organized by Mararhi Manasshatra Parishad. In the year 2013-14, Miss. Charuta Puranik attended the seminar and presented a paper.

> Publication of student magazines

Shabdotsav is the annual magazine published by the College for the Junior and Senior wings. The editor and its team, which comprise the staff members of both the wings, decide the theme for the yearly magazine.



Accordingly, the students contribute to the magazine by submitting articles and poems. The edited articles and poems are published in the magazine. The cover page of the magazine is always designed by the students of the Department of BVA. The students are encouraged to get the advertisements for the magazine and they get ten percent commission.

The magazine includes:

- Preface by the Principal
- The Editor's foreword
- Annual reports along with the photos of all the departments which include academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
- The names, along with of the photos of the retiring staff members and the scholarly students, group photos of teaching and non-teaching staff, and photos of important events, etc.
- Write-ups by the students

5.1.5. Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

In addition to the guest lectures and workshops, the College takes special efforts to facilitate entrepreneurial skills by organizing two exhibitions every year.

For the students of BVA exhibition-cum-sale is arranged every year not only in the College campus but also in the Art Gallery for giving exposure to the students. The students carry out all the activities right from booking the Art Gallery, setting up drawings, publicity and advertisement, etc.

The College also provides a platform to ex-students by arranging exhibitioncum- sale of their products. In the year 2013, the College encouraged the regular students to participate in this exhibition by setting stalls. This gave practical experience of the retail business to the students.

5.1.6. Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extracurricular and co-curricular activities such as sports, games, Quiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities, etc.

As a policy, the College encourages students to participate in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. At the College level, a Students' Council, a Study Circle, Cultural Department, Sports, N.S.S. and N.C.C. Departments actively arrange various activities throughout the year.

A team of teachers and student representatives plan the activities at the beginning of the year. The academic calendar reflects all the co-curricular and also the extra-curricular activities.

As a result of such activities, we observed a positive change in the personality, increased level of confidence, and high team spirit among the students.



Additional academic support, flexibility in examinations

Normally due care is taken to avoid clashes of different activities by preparing academic calendar at the College and the University levels. Apart from this, if students remain absent as a result of participation in other activities, teachers arrange separate guidance sessions. Flexibility is there while conducting internal tests at the College level for such students.

> Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and material

From the separate funds, for the Department of Physical Education and Sports, supplementary dietary items are provided to the students during practice sessions and actual competitions. Sports material and sports gears are also provided to the players for various competitions.

> Any other

The College and the University make arrangements for accommodation and transportation of the students participating in different competitions. Coaches are appointed for training purpose.

Our sports teacher, former student, Miss Radhika Raut, was nominated by the University for participating in International Coaching Camp of coaches for basketball in the U.S.A. in February 2012. Mrs. Vasanti Joshi is known for her expertise in adventure sports. Under her leadership students participate in Adventure Sports.

From 1989, the College has a separate Girls N.C.C. platoon that is attached to 2 Maharashtra Girls Battalion, Pune. It is the policy of the College to spare one teaching staff as an Associate N.C.C. Officer. Lt. Kashifa Inamdar is currently heading the platoon. Three staff members of our College are qualified NCC Officers by undergoings three months trainings at WOTS, Gwalior. Students from MIT College, Garware College, Law College, Poona College, Sadhana College, Jaihind College, T. J. College, and Trinity College are attached to the College Platoon for training purposes.

Trained Programme Officers organize the N.S.S. activities throughout the year. Over the years, fourteen staff members of the College have become qualified Programme Officers by undergoing orientation programmes for NSS Programme Officers.

Dr. Priya Jamkar, Assistant Professor of Marathi, Miss. Megha Patil, Assistant Professor of Geography, and Mrs. Archana Apte, Assistant Professor of Marathi, are welknown for their contribution in drama and script writing. Under their guidance students perform well in theatre events.

The Departments of Fine Arts contribute a lot for cultural events. The expertise of the teachers helps students to bag prizes in Musical Competitions and Drawing Competitions.

5.1.7. Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the



number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIR-NET, UGC-NET, SLET, ATE / CAT/GRE / TOFEL/GMAT/Central / State-services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.

Ours is an undergraduate college. Hence, a track record for such competitive examinations is not available. However, considering the record of alumni, a few students from the Arts Faculty have cleared NET/SET examination, a few students from Commerce Faculty have cleared GMAT, a few N.C.C. cadets have joined police services after passing "C" certificate examination. The students appear for these examinations after their graduation; therefore, the College cannot keep the record of the students clearing these examinations.

5.1.8. What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social, etc..)

Counseling services to the students are provided by the Placement Cell for enhancing employability, and by Career and Counseling Cell for psycho-social issues..

- ➤ On 19 December 2012, an exhibition was organized in the College informing the students of the various degree, diploma, and certificate courses in disciplines such as Arts, Social Sciences, Fine Arts, Commerce, Management, Computers, etc. On this occasion, the subject teachers provided valuable guidance to the students about how to choose the career.
- ➤ Mock interview sessions were conducted for the students of the BCA Programme. The experts interviewed the students. The students interviewed and the observers later said that they were benefited from this exercise.
- ➤ In addition to this, every year at the time of farewell function for the H.S.C. (Twelfth Grade) students and during the address for the first year students, the Principal gives an elaborate account of the opportunities of the upward mobility available to them in the faculties of Arts, Commerce, Computer Science, Fine Arts, and Social Sciences.
- To complement the above efforts for career guidance, an independent Counseling Centre is run by the teaching staff of Psychology. The main objective of the centre is to help the students to solve their personal problems. On an average 10 to 15 students are benefited each year.
- 5.1.9. Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? If 'yes', detail on the services provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview and the percentage of students selected during, campus interviews by different employers (list the employers and the programmes)



Dr. Smita Deshpande, an associate professor of Commerce, Prof. Jyotsna Bhave, and Prof. Madhuri Pant, both assistant professors of Computer Application are our placement officers. To make students aware of the corporate requirements, Placement cell provides exposure of written tests and interviews to students. The students who aspire to secure a job are successful in getting employment through placement cell.

Highlights of Placement Cell Activities

- Every year, the cell registers the last year students of B.A., B.Com, BCA, and BVA.
- ➤ Many Small Scale Organizations and Multinational Companies, such as, WIPRO, GOOGLE, WNS, E-CLERKS, ELECTRONICA FINANCE LIMITED, etc., approached the placement cell for vacancies in their firms.
- ➤ The College provides career guidance through guest <u>lectures</u> on various topics such as Interview Techniques, Communication Skills, etc.
- ➤ The cell displays articles relating to Competitive Examinations, Interview Techniques and Group Discussions on its notice board.
- ➤ Requirements from newspaper advertisements are displayed on notice boards and students are made aware of the job opportunities.
- ➤ Information about MBA, MCA, and B. Ed. entrance examinations is provided to the students. Guidance is provided for the preparation of these examinations. Group discussions and interviews are also conducted.
- ➤ Guest lectures on topics like Entrepreneurship Development, Aptitude Test are organized by the Placement Cell.
- ➤ The College also gives information of the Placement Cell activities to the second year students. The Placement cell provides counseling for :
 - a) Improving English Speaking,
 - b) Preparing for Written Examination,
 - c) Preparing for an Aptitude Test.
 - d) Facing a Group Discussion
 - e) Reading English newspapers
 - f) Doing activities, such as, self introduction in the classroom, etc.

In spite of such hard work, it is a fact that the Placement Cell has not been able to provide employment to a significant number of students. The main reasons for this are:

About eighty percent of the students come from non-English medium schools and here too they do B. A. or B. Com. through Marathi medium. As a result, their competence in written and spoken English is not good. For most of the job opportunities that are notified to the Cell require good knowledge of English. Many job opportunities that are referred to the Cell are such that they have to be done in the night shift. Such jobs are not found suitable by the



students of this College. The College functions in the afternoon shift, and it is difficult for the students to do any full time job. Most of the students who take admission to this College come from orthodox families and, apparently, their parents are averse to their daughters' doing jobs. Hence, the Placement Cell activities are in budding stage.

In the last two years, about hundred and ninety two students appeared for written tests and campus interviews of which fifty-two were selected by different corporate.

5.1.10. Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievance reported and redressed during the last four years.

Yes, the College has a Student Redressal Cell. The Principal, Vice Principal, Students' Council- in-charge, and General Secretary of the College are the members of this cell. The Students' Council consists of teaching staff and the students. The representatives have close and harmonious relationship with the students. No major grievances are reported during the last four years.

5.1.11. What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

The Institution has an Anti Sexual Harassment Cell, which functions under the Principal of the College. We are happy to note that no such grievance occurred. Guest lectures are organized for the students on topics pertaining to gender sensitivity, respect for women, etc., which promote culture of peace and tolerance on our campus.

5.1.12. Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

Yes, as per the rules and guidelines issued by the Government, the College has an anti-ragging committee, which consists of the Principal and senior members of the teaching staff, Hostel Superintendent, and the General Secretary of the College.

At the time of admission, the College gets the properly filled up affidavits from the Parents and Students which are enclosed as annexures 1 and 2 of the prospectus.



The College displays the information about the Objective of Anti Ragging, Definition of Ragging, Punishable Ingredients of Ragging, Suggested Punishments at Institutional Level, and Names of the Anti Ragging Committee along with the Help Line Numbers. "Say No to Ragging" is the slogan that is mentioned on displayed information. No major instance has been reported during the last four years.

5.1.13. Enumerate the welfare schemes made available to students by the institution

Largely welfare schemes cover free ships and financial assistance to the students. In addition, to make the outstation students comfortable, the hostel facility and subsidized canteen facility are available on the campus. For safety and security, a centralized security is provided by the University. The schemes of travel concession for going to native place or for local transport are also made available to the students.

5.1.14. Does the institution have a registered Alumni Association? If 'yes', what are its activities and major contributions for institutional, academic and infrastructure development?

The College has an Alumni Association and registration of it is in process. The College organizes guest lectures and invites alumni on the occasion of the Birth anniversary of Maharshi Karve every year. In the month of December, just before the Annual Social Gathering, the College arranges 'exhibition cum sale' of the products prepared by the ex-students. This not only gives support to the ex-students but also sets an example of entrepreneurship in front of present students. About sixteen stalls are arranged every year. From the year 2013-14, it was decided to encourage current students also to set stalls. Accordingly, in the year 2013-14, along with the alumni, six groups of current students also set their stalls.

5.2. Student progression

5.2.1 Providing the percentage of students progressing to higher education or employment (for the last four batches) highlight the trends observed.

In the faculty of Arts, we offer specialization in Languages like Marathi and Hindi, and in Social Sciences like Psychology, Geography and Economics. From this stream, a number of our past students have blazed a trail in the field of women's education, literature, politics, and social work. A number of past students with specialization in Fine Arts like Vocal Music and Visual Arts have earned prominence in these fields. In the faculty of Commerce, our students secure positions in corporate fields. The students of BCA have got placements in the field of IT.

Remedial teaching and counseling support are given to the students who are at the risk of failure and drop out. Sometimes parents are also called for counseling. Additional lectures, practice sessions, micro-teaching, library assignments and re-tutorials help the students to clear the examinations.

d) N.S.S. Activities:

 Workshops, lectures, awareness campaign, poster competition were organized in different institutions.

5.3.3 How does the college seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers, to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

Every year the College collects and analyzes the feedback from the students. This written feedback includes questions to judge the teachers' performance, administrative support, and infrastructure facilities.

The Principal discusses the analysis of the feedback with each staff member and collective efforts are carried out to improve upon.

Our IQAC comprises representation of alumni, stakeholders, and employer. Interaction with them helps the management to improve the performance and quality.

5.3.4 How does the college involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, college magazine, and other material? List the publications/ materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.

The College magazine, Shabdotsav, is published every year. In addition to the reports of the various activities, the aim of the publication is to encourage the students to write articles, and poems and give a scope to their creativity.

5.3.5 Does the College have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

A Students' Council is formed as per the Maharashtra Universities Act, 1994. It consists of Principal as Chairman and Vice-Principal. One assistant professor, as Students' Council-in-charge, Associate N.C.C. Officer, N.S.S. Programme Officer, One student from each class who has shown academic merit at the examination held in previous year are nominated by the Principal, Teacher of sports education, one student representative of N.S.S., N.C.C., Sports and cultural activities, and of two students from reserved categories (SC,ST,DT/NT) are also the members. Students' Council members elect from themselves one General Secretary.



The role of Students' Council is to look after the welfare of the students and to promote and co-ordinate extra-curricular activities in the College. They do not engage in political activities. The Council is actively engaged in outlining the Annual Social Gathering, Prize Distribution Ceremony, a Teachers' Day, farewell functions, etc. Funds are provided for Students' Council activities out of the Gymkhana Fund.

5.3.6 Give details of various academic and administrative bodies that have student representatives on them.

The Students' Council is a main body with maximum student representation. Representatives of each class are a member of this body. In addition, all co-curricular and extra-curricular departments have the students' representation.

The General Secretary for the year happened to be a member of IQAC, Anti-Ragging Committee, and Students' Redressal Committee.

Two students are nominated as Hostel Representatives. N.C.C., N.S.S. and Sports nominate senior students to help the in-charge faculty member.

While organizing the Annual Social Gathering, Regional Yuva Mahotsav, N.S.S. camps, Sports meet, etc. students are involved in various committees responsible for effective organization and administration.

Moto of 'Students Centric Activities' is achieved through hundred percent involvement and active participation of the students.

5.3.7 How does the institution network and collaborate with the Alumni and former faculty of the institution.



Traditionally telephone diary happened to be source for developing contacts with alumni and former faculty members. Now students of the Department of B.C.A. are connected through the net. Teachers share study material with the current students. Past students are also informed about job opportunities through net. Students of the Department Marathi have a group on face book. They share interesting reading material and their thoughts through that group. Students participating in various sports have formed their group on Whatsapp. So the College also has started using new-tech-based modes of communication.

In the year 2013-14, the College took initiative in developing functional web site. Once it is in operation more efforts will be taken to build effective network. Registration of Alumni Association is in process. This will help to develop more formal contact with the past students.

Retired faculty members are invited on important occasions. Annual Social Gathering gives opportunity to call former faculty members. At times they contribute by sharing their experiences. We have a close bonding as a Family.

- Career counseling Cell guides the students to take admission to Masters'
 Degree. In the campus, the University Centre for Post Graduate Studies is

- Our N.S.S.P.O. Mrs. Anjali Kadam received the Best Programme Officer Award. Honorable Home Minister R. R. Patil felicitated her on 17 January 2014.
- N.S.S. has adopted a village Sudawadi, Tal. Maval, Zilla Pune.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND M ANAGEMENT

Introduction

The College is a constituent College of the SNDT Women's University. It runs undergraduate programmes on grant-in-aid as well as self-sufficiency basis. Principal, the administrative head of the Institution, and the Vice Principal share responsibilities related to the students. The IQAC takes care of the maintenance and enhancement of quality in teaching, learning, evaluation, research, and the co- curricular, the extra-curricular, and extension activities. The Departmental issues are handled by the Heads of the Department.

The committees are also formed for specific purposes such as the Planning Committee, Budget Committee, Purchase Committee, Research Committee, Examination Committee, Career Guidance and Placement Cell, Magazine Committee, Cultural and Students' Welfare Committee, Enrichment Programmes Committee, Staff and Students' Redressal Cell, Anti-Ragging Committee, RTI Committee, N.S.S. Advisory Committee, etc.

The office has a senior clerk and a junior accountant and the other clerical and class IV staff to handle day to day functioning of the College. Automation of office procedures has been initiated to improve efficiency of work.

The mission 'Sanskrita Stree Parashakti' and the objective of 'Quality in Every Activity' are attained through thoughtful planning, proper implementation, and meticulous monitoring.

6.1. Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1. State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

The SNDT Arts and Commerce College for Women was founded by Bharatratna Maharshi Dhondo Keshav Karve on 5 July 1916, with five students. It is this College at Pune, with which he started the functioning of the Indian Women's University. This College is thus the very first Institution of the University. Today, it functions as a Constituent College, owned and governed, by the SNDT Women's University, Mumbai. Both the College as well as the University came to be named after Shreemati Nathibai Damodar Thackersey, mother of Sir Vitthaldas Thackersey, who generously donated an amount of Rs. Fifteen Lakh in the year 1920.

The Philosophy of Dr. Karve, the Founder and the first principal of the College, was to transform the students into confident, self-reliant, responsible individuals, who can be a source of infinite strength to their families, and their community. This is as relevant today, as it was a hundred years ago. Guided



by this Philosophy, the College has been providing such atmosphere as is most relevant, distinctive, and unique to cater the special needs of the students along with the regular academic programmes.

"Sanskrita Stree Parashakti", meaning 'An enlightened woman is a source of Infinite strength', aptly encapsulates the vision of Maharshi Karve to build a citadel of learning for women. The College, for over nine decades, has been striving hard to translate this motto into reality.

Being a constituent College of the SNDT Women's University, the College pursues the vision and the mission of the University in Toto. The Vision of the University is, "Today we visualise the SNDT Women's University as a world class university that continually responds to the changing social realities through the development and application of knowledge. The purpose of such engagement will be to create an inclusive society that promotes and protects the dignity, equality, social justice and human rights for all, with special emphasis on empowerment of women." In the light of this vision, the University has envisaged the mission to be, "SNDT Women's University is committed to the cause of women's empowerment through access to education, particularly higher education, through relevant courses in the formal and non-formal streams. Further the University is committed to provide a wide range of professional and vocational courses for women to meet the changing socio-economic needs, with human values and purposeful social responsibility and to achieve excellence with "Quality in every Activity"

Keeping an eye on the need for the women's empowerment as well as the changing societal realities, the College has always tried to introduce the appropriate new professional and vocational courses. It always conducts regular programmes with a view to making students aware of the need for the social equality and justice.

At international level, the concern for inclusion of women in higher education was expressed in various conferences and workshops in the late twentieth century. It was found that because of an increase in the enrollment at the secondary education level, the access of women to higher education had improved significantly. This improvement, however, was not uniform in different countries of the world; and, was also not reflected in the increased proportion of women in decision-making process. Women in Maharashtra, as a part of the feminine population of India, belong to the deprived or excluded sections of the society. Even today, the status of women in Maharashtra, as far as higher education is concerned, seems to be blurred. Very wide disparity exists between men and women, as far as availability of opportunities in higher education system is concerned. This fact justifies the very existence of our College and the University. However, as far as the College is concerned, the reality is not as rosy as it appears. It has been experiencing the depletion of students of late. To address this difficulty, in addition to the policy of



introducing new academic programmes, the College has decided to place emphasis on English as a medium of instruction in the Arts faculty and to offer employability-enhancing short-term courses. The objectives of the College are:

- Provide access to higher education for girls through formal academic courses.
- Provide multidisciplinary academic and vocational courses for students to meet the socio-economic demands.
- Engage students in research activities in emerging areas of study with focus on women's perspectives.
- Inculcate among students positive self- concept, awareness of women's issues and rights with a rational outlook towards society.
- Impart meaningful education with social relevance and orientation.
- Achieve excellence in the academic and extension activities through emphasis on 'quality in every activity'.

6.1.2. What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The quality policy and plans of the College are designed and implemented by the I.Q.A.C. in consultation with the faculty members. While doing so, I.Q.A.C. adopts a dual approach. It decides the quality plans in details keeping in view the long-term quality policy. The top management and the Principal have entrusted all the powers and the freedom to the I.Q.A.C. in this regard. In the periodic review meetings of the I.Q.A.C. the management representative as well as the Principal actively participate and tender their concrete suggestions for effective implementation of the policies and plans.

6.1.3. What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring: -the policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission

To address the difficulty of the depletion of students, in addition to the policy of introducing new academic programmes, the College has decided to place emphasis on English as a medium of instruction in the Arts faculty and to offer employability-enhancing short-term courses. The action plans of the College are:

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- Inculcate among students positive self- concept, awareness of women's issues and rights with a rational outlook towards society.
- Impart meaningful education with social relevance and orientation.
- Achieve excellence in the academic and extension activities through emphasis on 'quality in every activity'.

•formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan

Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into institutional strategic plan regulated and administered through various committees of teaching and non-teaching staff members as well as the students. The committees of teachers are constituted for both academic and non-academic activities of the College for each academic year. Every subject has an association to decide various academic programmes such as guestlectures of experts in the field, workshops on the latest developments and recent trends, demonstrations and the quizzes for the students throughout the year. There are committees of teachers for cultural and sporting events; and also, for extra-curricular activities such as N.S.S., N.C.C.. These committees take decisions in their regular meetings. As a part of the College administration, there are committees to formulate the time-table, and the examination schedules. For the effective participation of the students in the college activities, there are committees of students as well. In addition to the Students' Council, the College has the Study Circle, and *Jigar* Club. Thus, all the decisions about both the curricular and non-curricular aspects of the College functioning are taken in a participative manner.

The College always encourages staff members and students to give valuable suggestions with a view to improving the quality of its functioning, formally or otherwise. The scheme of the suggestion box for students has been the regular feature of the College. Special meetings of the Students' Council are convened by the Principal in this regard from time-to-time. Even the staff members and students are entertained by the principal for every kind of suggestion informally.

Interaction with stakeholders


The College tries to have regular and consistent interaction with all its stakeholders with a view to getting their suggestions and feedback for improving and strengthening its functioning through meetings. The students of the College take active part in the functioning of the College, through the Students' Council Meetings. The College interacts with the parents of the students formally as well as informally. The meetings of the parents are one of the regular features of different departments of the College.

In addition to the prime stakeholders, namely students and the parents, the staff members of the College carry out various tasks assigned to them by the Government, may it be voters' enrollment drive, traffic awareness drive,



election duty, or Census data collection. The teaching staff members and students interact with the society through the programmes of N.S.S., and extension activities. The College has established tie-ups with the NGOs in Pune city by organising programmes for their activists.

•Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders

The I.Q.A.C. along with the teaching faculty members of the College periodically assesses the needs of the students through the students' feedback. The policies and plans of the College are then reviewed on the basis of the need analysis.

Reinforcing the culture of excellence

The culture of excellence is boosted by the I.Q.A.C. along with the teaching faculty members of the College through proper orientation of the students and



is nurtured in the performance of the students in every academic and non-academic endeavour.

Champion organizational change

The organizational structure of this College is standardised by the norms set by the University. During last five years, the College has strived to strengthen this structure for enhancing the efficiency; mainly, as regards admissions and examinations.

6.1.4. What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The policies and plans are decided and monitored by the Principal and the I.Q.A.C. through the meetings of Local Management Committee, Planning Board, Heads of the Departments, and Students' Council.

The College has a regular system to get feedback from the staff members and students orally and in writing. This helps to understand the success of policies and plans implemented from time-to-time. An attempt is made to rectify the shortfalls.

6.1.5. Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The teaching faculty of the College actively participates in the academic management of the University through membership of various bodies such as Boards of Studies, Faculty, Board of Examination, and Unfair Means Committee.

The College has evolved a long-term strategy for improving the academic quality of the teaching staff by directing them to undertake and complete the research projects for the academic degrees as well as under the UGC funded schemes. There is an insistence on the part of the College that the teachers should seek the membership of the subject-associations and bodies, and should actively participate in their activities.

6.1.6. How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

- The teachers and the members of the administrative staff are actively involved in various decisions relating to their areas of functioning. They are given authority to take decisions within their functional powers.
- The Students' Council of the College encourages the General Secretary and Class Representatives to decide various student-related cultural, extra-curricular, and co-curricular activities of the College. The Study Circle organizes its activities throughout the year as per the requirements and the suggestions of its members.



6.1.7. How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

- The College has a few departments, which independently function on the academic front.
- The individual departments undertake practical programmes and the exhibitions of the academic performance of their students. The students are well guided by the faculty members.
- The departments organise their tours and visits of students as per their requirements.
- The departments are given freedom to organise the guest lectures, as well as other academic and extra-curricular activities for their students.

The functioning of the College is regulated and administered through various committees of teaching and non-teaching staff members as well as the students. 6.2.1. Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?



6.2.3. Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.


The College has statutory organizational structure designed as per the norms of the Government and the University. The Institutional Head is the Principal




and there are Vice Principals for the senior and the Junior College. The administrative activities in the College Office are managed by the Head Clerk and Principal collectively. The College has post of Hawaldar who is in-charge of the class IV support staff.

The College has separate committees to look after the major student-related activities. The admissions, examinations, as well as cultural activities of the College are effectively implemented and monitored by these committees. The Purchase Committee, Planning Board Committee, Local Management Committee, and the I.Q.A.C. effectively monitor the functioning of the College.

6.2.4. Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

Teaching & Learning

The College insists on enhancing the effectiveness of the teaching-learning process by encouraging the use of technology, information and telecommunication system.

Research & Development

The policy of the College about research and development is to encourage teachers to undertake projects relevant to the women's empowerment.

-Community engagement

The College encourages teachers and the students to undertake every extra, cocurricular activity by considering the local social requirements.

-Human resource management

Every teaching and non-teaching staff member of the College is encouraged to pursue his or her own professional career by giving the opportunity to participate in workshops, seminars, and conferences.

Industry interaction

The College has a dual strategy for industry-interaction; first, as a source of human resource to the industry; and second, as recipient of the expert knowledge from the industry to acquaint students with the applied part of their academic syllabi.



6.2.5. How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The College has regular management information system in which the reports are given regularly to the University authorities and various Departments. Some of the reports are highly specific in respect of students' admissions, examination results, vacant positions, staff appointments, etc. There are circulars and letters from time-to-time to implement the policies and plans from the University which the College gets through the electronic mails as well as in the hardcopy form.

6.2.6. How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The S. N. D. T. Women's University, being the management of the College, gives due representation to the College on its various academic and non-academic bodies like Local Enquiry Committees, Senate, Budget Scrutiny Committee, and so on. The University Authorities call meetings from time-to-time to get the data about achievement of objectives and targets.

6.2.7. Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

The College is a conducted institution of the SNDT Women's University and the Management is University authorities collectively. There is no separate management council till the current year. However, the steps have been initiated to appoint a Local Managing Committee for the College.

6.2.8. Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

The S. N. D. T. Women's University, Mumbai, has the provision of according the status of autonomy to the College. However, the College has not yet applied for it.

6.2.9. How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The College has to follow the statutory grievances redressal mechanism for the students and the employees. Every effort is undertaken to prevent and avert the grievances by adhering to the rules and regulations. The Students'



Council and the CRs of various classes are involved informally to get the early warning of any such grievance.


6.2.10. During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

The College has no court case filed by or against during the last four years. However, there is one court case a filed by retired employee in the year 2005 regarding provident fund claim settlement. The court decision is pending till date.

6.2.11. Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The feedback from the students and the alumni is formally taken by the College in writing. The students give the feedback every year at the end of the academic year. This feedback includes their responses for both the academic inputs and administrative services. In addition to this formal feedback, the College gets the feedback from the students through the enquiries, complaints, and the suggestions. The Principal of the College treats every such feedback personally. The feedback about individual employee and teacher is handled by one-to-one discussions and the collective matters are discussed in the meetings of the respective staff. The feedback of the students is also considered by the I.Q.A.C. while setting the quality parameters. The diagram below depicts the student-feedback mechanism of the College.

Better Teaching and Learning

The College has a policy of collecting written feedback from the parents of the students seeking admission to the second and the third years. The various departments of the College also collect the feedback of the parents in the parents' meetings. The parents are also invited and involved by the College in its various formal functions.

6.3. Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1. What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

It is the policy of the College to encourage the teaching faculty members to undertake research activities related to the topics from the curriculum in order to enhance the competency. The non-teaching staff members are encouraged to upgrade their functional and technical skills.

6.3.2. What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The teaching faculty members are deputed by the College to attend the research-related seminars, workshops, and orientations by sanctioning the duty leave. The permanent teachers of the College have undergone the orientation and refresher courses in time. All permanent teachers are provided training in the use of information, and communication technology in education.

The non-teaching staff members are also deputed by the College for various workshops and seminars organised by the Government Departments and the University from time-to-time.

6.3.3. Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The College follows the policy of annual performance appraisal mechanism for both the teaching and the non-teaching staff. The duly filled-in six-monthly confidential reports of the non-teaching staff members are regularly submitted to the University after proper review by the reporting and reviewing Officers. Based on the Academic Performance Indicators, assessment of the teaching staff members is done by the I.Q.A.C. Coordinator every year and the confidential reports are submitted to the University for the Career Assessment Scrutiny.

6.3.4. What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they



communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The College has a system of performance appraisal reports every year to be submitted by the employee every year. The evaluated performance is regularly communicated to the teaching and non-teaching employee orally by the Principal. These reports are used from time-to-time for departmental promotions of non-Teaching staff and Career Advancement of teaching Staff.

6.3.5. What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The College has statutory and non-statutory welfare schemes designed for time to time. The teaching and non-teaching staff members take benefit of these schemes. Some of these schemes are listed as under:

- a. Every permanent staff member contributes to the GPF of the Government.
- b. Every non-teaching staff member is eligible to get the festival advance.
- c. Every staff member can avail himself or herself of the travel to hometown facility every four years.
- d. All the staff members can avail the facility of medical reimbursement facility for themselves and their dependents as per the Government Rules.
- e. The staff members of the College can be the members of the Cooperative Credit Society of the SNDT Women's University. They can avail themselves of the facility of getting loan from the society.
- f. The uniforms are provided to the permanent Class IV employees every two years. They are also given the washing allowance.
- g. The children of the disabled or dead employees on duty get employment on compassionate grounds.

6.3.6. What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The College being a constituent College of a Statutory University, it is bound by the rules and regulations of the State Government for appointing and retaining the faculty. However, the College always encourages the Departments to organise guest lectures, workshops, and conferences to attract eminent faculty.

6.4. Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1. What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The College has Accounts Department working under the guidance of Finance and Accounts Department of the University. It is the practice of the University to prepare the annual budget in the month of February, which is approved by



the University authorities before the beginning of the next financial year. There is revised budget approval system in the month of October every year. This budgetary system is based on the number of students admitted to the College.

The budget provisions are strictly adhered as the Government grants are received and utilised. Every year, the budgets are scrutinized in the beginning and reviewed in the middle of the financial year for assuring the optimum utilization of the budget.

6.4.2. What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

For the last three years, the College gets the Accounts audited by the Internal Auditors before the Statutory Audit. After completing the Internal Audit, the Statutory Audit is also usually completed by the College in the prescribed time schedule.

6.4.3. What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The College has more than adequate reserves and corpus fund which have been accumulated since the inception of the College. They are safely preserved in the fixed deposits. The College has specific plans for the utilisation of these funds.

6.4.4. Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The College utilises four main sources of resource mobilisation. The prime source of the financial resources to the College is grants from the Government and the UGC. It collects special purpose as well as general donations for students' activities and for giving them academic awards and prizes. The premises of the College are regularly let-out for the academic activities to the Government Departments and other academic Institutions. The teaching staff members contribute to the financial resources of the College by rendering the consultancy services to other Institutions and NGOs.

- 6.5. Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)
- 6.5.1. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (I.Q.A.C.)
- a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (I.Q.A.C.)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?



- The I.Q.A.C. encourages teaching faculty members to undertake the major, minor, and departmental research projects involving the students.
- I.Q.A.C. has suggested the strategy of holding alumni organized Exhibition of products and articles of the past and the present students of the College.
- I.Q.A.C. is actively involved in the staff appraisal system.

b. How many decisions of the I.Q.A.C. have been approved by the management/authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The management encourages and approves every decision taken by the I.Q.A.C. and all the decisions are implemented by the College.

c. Does the I.Q.A.C. have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

The external members of the I.Q.A.C. belong to the academic Institutions in Pune; and hence, have proved to be of great help to the College in introduction of the quality systems as well as in the preparation of the AQARs and SSR.

d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the I.O.A.C.?

The alumni and the students are actively involved in the functioning of the I.Q.A.C. There is student and alumani representation in the I.Q.A.C. The General Secretary of the College and the reprentative of Alumani Association are the members of the I.Q.A.C.

e. How does the I.Q.A.C. communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The I.Q.A.C. has a system of appointing various committees for day-to-day functioning of the College. These committees function for organizing co-curricular and extra-curricular activities which include quality enhancement of teaching, learning and evaluation.

6.5.2. Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

The College has integrated framework of quality assurance for better functioning of academic and administrative activities. It includes planning board, research committee, exam committee, which are monitored by the Principal and Vice-Principal. The infrastructure development aspect is undertaken by the University authorities from time to time as per the needs of the College.



6.5.3. Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

The College organizes workshops and programmes for training the staff for effective implementation of quality assurance procedure. The Principal, Vice-Principal and Heads of the Department monitor the impact of such training.

6.5.4. Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

The College has a few departments at the under graduate level and an appropriate quality system is being established for conducting academic audit in the near future.

The College has a well established quality assurance mechanism as per the guidelines given by the NAAC. The internal quality assurance programmes are undertaken from time to time as per these guidelines.

6.5.6. What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

- The College has a system of periodic review of teaching-learning process adopted by the teachers.
- There is the use of ICT tools providing audio-visual aids for class room teaching.
- The students are encouraged to submit their assignments as well as present their assignments by using PowerPoint presentations.
- There is exchange of teaching material and other material from teachers to students in the soft and the hard forms.
- The extra lectures and counselling sessions are conducted for academically weak students of the College.
- The Study Circle has been established in the College for academically advanced students so that they get opportunities for better career-oriented courses.
- The College gives emphasis on the overall development of the students by organizing regular activities like visits to companies, blood donation camps, visits to orphanages and old-age homes, etc,.



• The faculty members give library assignments to the students to encourage the use of library services.

6.5.7. How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

- The College has established the Total Quality Management with prior approval from the University Authorities, which is the management of the College.
- There are periodic meetings of the Heads of the Department, Examination Committee, Cultural Committee, Class Representatives, Parent-Teacher Association, and Alumni Association.
- There are periodic meetings of the I.Q.A.C., in which various resolutions are passed and implemented in accordance with the UGC Rules and the University Guidelines.
- There are periodic meetings of Planning Board and the Local Managing Committee.
- The College has undertaken massive technology utilisation programme with the MKCL, which covers on-line admissions, on-line generation of Identity cards, examination forms, and other documents.
- The AQARs of the last seven years have been submitted to the NAAC.

Introduction

The College promotes the use of innovative practices in teaching, learning, evaluation process and the day to day administrative functioning for raising the quality and efficiency. To inculcate values such as gender equality and environmental protection, a gender audit and green audit are pursued. Many best practices such as 'Jigar' adventure sports club, exhibitions of alumni and regular students, workshops on personality development, health awareness programmes, intercollegiate elocution competitions, interdisciplinary survey based research projects in women related issues, Geo- Fest, Computer Fest, etc. are organized with the objectives to make our students globally competent, to build confidence, entrepreneurship and creativity amongst them, to empower them with health and skills, to create awareness about the social issues and to inculcate good morals and values for being good citizens of the nation.

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1. Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The College is situated at Karve Road, which is a very crowded road. However, the College campus is rich with many trees and a small hill behind. The environment is eco-friendly. The College will undertake Green Audit next year, with the help of the Department of Geography of our College, in collaboration with the Geography Department of Fergusson College, as recommended by the IQAC.


7.1.2. What are the initiatives taken by the College to make the campus eco-friendly?

- The College campus is enriched with many trees. The N.S.S. volunteers and N.C.C. cadets undertake tree plantation programmes on the campus to keep it green.
- The College keeps wet and solid waste garbage in separate containers and garbage is properly handed over to the Municipality as well as the rag -



pickers (paper, glass, waste metal tins, and plastic waste, etc. collectors). KKPKP (Kagad Kach Patra Kashtakari Panchayat), a Rag- pickers union, working in Pune, is promoting the separation of waste at household level: families separate their waste into biodegradable and non-biodegradable, and rag pickers go from house to house to collect it and then sell what can be sold. What cannot be reused is sent to the dump, and the biodegradable waste is composted at source. The College is using these means to resolve the problem of wet and solid waste.

- For old Newspapers and old tutorials and answer paper sheets, disposal is done by getting tenders or quotations.
- Old furniture is disposed of by selling it through quotations.
- Pune has grown multifold in the past decade, emerging from its sleepyretirement-town image into a thriving metropolis. New challenges like disposal of e-Waste are already in the horizon due to rapid growth of IT industry in and around Pune. SWACH, a worker owned co-operative in Pune, which was born in 2007 as a vehicle that would provide front end waste management services to the city of Pune, entered into a formal memorandum of understanding with Pune Municipal Corporation for door to door collection of waste in 2008. SWACH has been authorized by the PMC to collect and channel e-waste according to the rules lay down by the government for dealing with hazardous waste. Seemingly harmless batteries, mobile phones, chargers, etc., actually pose a grave danger to the environment and people when improperly disposed. Collection bins can be set up in schools, campuses, offices, shopping malls, etc. The ewaste that is generated in the College such as old computers and other equipments in computer laboratories and offices is scrapped out through 'SWACH'.



• The College creates environmental awareness among the students by undertaking various programmes. Following programmes have been conducted in this concern from year 2009-10 to 2013-14.

7.2. Innovations

7.2.1. Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the College.

- To help the staff members in undertaking innovative teaching methods, the College purchased a LCD projector, laptop and new mike system in the year 2010-11.
- To introduce the teachers to the latest information technology, the University Technical Education Department organized a five-day workshop on the 'Use of ICT in Education' on Pune campus. Three staff members of the College successfully completed the workshop in the year 2011-12.
- To facilitate the Management to think in the direction of starting new programmes, the Honourable Vice-Chancellor a meeting with the parents on the Pune campus in the year 2011-12.
- To maintain discipline and standardise the time schedule of the teaching and non-teaching staff, a Bio-metric machine was installed in the College, in the year 2011-12.
- To facilitate the students with the use of computer in self-learning, an additional computer laboratory with 25 computers was set up in the year 2011-12.
- To assist teachers to understand and to communicate the changes in the newly introduced syllabus as from the year 2009-10, the College organised content analysis workshops for some subjects and also encouraged the teachers to participate in the workshops on content analysis organised at other colleges of SNDT Women's University. In these workshops the objectives of the courses and their scope were specified. To make learning easy for students question banks were prepared.
- To help the teachers to use the innovative teaching methods relating to the use of ICT in teaching, the College organised a six-day workshop on "Use of ICT in teaching" for all faculty members in the year 2012-13.
- To assess effectiveness of teaching-learning process, continuous internal assessment is done by the teachers. Seminars, workshops, presentations, group discussions, role plays, study visits, projects etc. are the various innovative methods used for this purpose.
- To increase the efficiency of the office staff, computerisation of office procedures, especially, related to accounts is in process and will be complete in coming years.
- A system is set for clean and garbage free classrooms, washrooms and campus.



- Online admission procedure has been started with the initiative of the University since 2013-14, which aided maintaining transparency in admission process. Identity cards for students are generated automatically through computerisation from the year 2013-14.
- Automation and modernization of examination system:
 To improve the efficiency and secrecy in Examination System, the following innovations are implemented.
- 1. Online examination registration of students for College as well as University examinations is started from the year 2013-14.
- 2. Computerisation of examination-admit cards for students is done since 2013-14. Computerisation of class wise students' lists for examinations is done since 2013-14.
- 3. Examination question papers are received online from the University and downloaded and printed at a secured place for maintaining secrecy from 2009-10 for B.C.A. programme and from 2013-14 for B.A., B.Com. and B.V.A. programmes.
- 4. Computerisation of examination seating arrangements is done for The University examinations from 2013-14.
- 5. The mark sheets of the first year semester examination were Computerized from 2013-14.
- 6. Internal evaluation data for The University Examinations is Computerised from 2013-14 and is in process for the first year College semester examinations.

Best Practice 1

Title of the Practice: 'Jigar', Adventure Club of the College and Pune to Kanyakumari Long Distance Cycle Rally of the 22 Girl Students.

Goal: Women Empowerment through Adventure Sports

The major objectives of the club are:

- a) To give a wide exposure to the girl students of the College.
- b) To establish and encourage team work among participants.
- c) To allow participants an opportunity to handle challenges within defined boundaries.
- d) To build up participants' self esteem and confidence.
- e) To bring Women Empowerment through Adventure Sports.

Our College has been organizing treks, cycle rallies, valley-crossing, preparing students to participate in the national competition "Enduro₃", as a part of our



Jigar adventure club from this year 2007-08. To enlarge the horizon of the activities of the club, a unique long distance cycle rally, was planned in the year 2013-14.

The Context:

In 1998, the UGC initiated a scheme for promotion of adventure sports, in which, College and the University students could participate. During the IX Plan period, the Department of Youth Affairs and Sports decided to disburse grants to universities and colleges. The aim and objective of the scheme is to create and foster a spirit of risk-taking, co-operative team work, and the capacity to face and effectively deal with challenging situations with courage and determination amongst the students of Universities or Colleges. The UGC has also clarified the eligibility criteria, nature of activity, its duration, number of participants, etc. (www.ugc.ac.in). Under this plan, in the year 2012-13 the University provided 10 cycles to the students of Pune Campus.

In this background, a cycle rally covering more than 1500 kilometers organized by an educational institution only for female students is a unique activity and that too when our motto is 'Women's Empowerment'.

Evidence of Success:

In the early years the College had to make special efforts to convince students and the parents for participation in outdoor activities. Now the students are eagerly waiting for the announcements and the parents too have faith and confidence in organization of these adventure activities. We observe that participation and success in such activities increases their level of confidence and team spirit.

The jewel in the crown of all these adventure activities, Pune to Kanyakumari Girls' cycle rally, was a great success and was well recognized by many. Our two staff members conducted a survey of impact of this rally on the personality of the participating students and presented a paper in the national seminar. According to the outcome of the survey long distance cycle rally had positive impact on many personality traits. As a result of the rally, students' positive emotionality increased, their negative emotionality was reduced and traits such as self-confidence, self-efficacy, sociability, optimism, etc. were improved. This study showed that adventure program have positive impact on the overall personality of female youth and can be considered a strong tool for Women's Empowerment.

Few have joined the other institutions as physical instructors and started similar activity.



Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

With the support of the College authorities the activities of Jigar, the adventure club, are organized. This year, the club thought of an ambitious cycle rally from Pune to Kanyakumari with lots of challenges ahead.

While planning the rally, the difficulties like finance, safety of girls, permission from management viz. SNDT Women's University and from the girls' parents, and boarding and lodging on route were considered.

The difficulties were resolved with the generous helping hands of innumerable well-wishers and a support from the University and College. The patrons like 'Girikand Tours and Travels' and 'Lifecycle' were the associates for providing logistic and technical support. Bajaj Electricals was the title sponsor of this rally as a symbol of its association with women and their empowerment. With financial support of bankers, builders, and more than 100 donors from corners of the society, the College could raise funds for the rally. Mrs. Vasanti Joshi, Associate Professor of Commerce, SNDT Arts and Commerce College, was leading the rally. Ms. Radhika Raut, our sports teacher shared the responsibility with Mrs. Joshi.

Notes:

The field of outdoor adventure activities is typically dominated by boys and the girls are not permitted to participate in such activities. SNDT Arts and Commerce College for Women has overcome this social custom and has made 'adventure sport', a normal practice for the girl students. The message is carried forward from the earlier students to the new entrants who help the College to carry on the activity as a routine practice.

The experiences of the rally enriched the members in all angles. They judged their physical strength and endurance by paddling about 100 kilometer distance every day. The exposure enhanced their mental fitness and soft skills like team building, public speaking, leadership, time management, cope up with challenges, etc. and their interaction with learned members rendering selfless services to the society was eye-opening for social awareness. It was a journey from 'I' to 'We'.

In nutshell, this dream rally was a collective effort of the University, our College, all the staff members- teaching and non-teaching, all prestigious sponsors, well-wishers, parents, our associate organizers and last but not the least our students who put their hearts for the success of the rally.



Best Practice 2:

Title of the practice: Interdisciplinary Research Projects based on Survey method of Data Collection

Goals:

- a) To give the students exposure in framing the questionnaire and administering it with a view to collecting data and writing report
- b) To give students hands-on experience of data tabulation and of drawing primary Statistical inferences with the help of MS Excel

The context

This practice was required to be made interdisciplinary because it involved the interpretation and drawing of inferences on the basis of huge statistical data collected, which the students learning English found difficult. Hence, these tasks were got done from the students learning Industrial Statistics.

The practice:

Every year, the students learning English are given the exercise of preparing and administering a questionnaire relating to a specific topic focusing on women's issues. They submit a brief report of the information collected. On an average, the data from six hundred respondents are collected. Then, the students learning Industrial Statistics enter the data collected in Excel format and do its primary Statistical analysis.

The detailed complete report of this information is prepared by the teacher of English based on the analysis of the full data collected using the SPSS by the teacher of Industrial Statistics. These reports are submitted to different Institutions for publication. The list of various projects undertaken in the last seven years is given below:

The salient feature of the higher education system is to sharpen the analytical and logical skills of the students, which requires practical exposure and opportunity to express opinions. These projects are undertaken with a view to achieve this purpose.

Evidence of success:

Such types of projects fulfill the needs of the NGOs, Governmental agencies, and other academic institutions. The reports generated through these surveys help them in decision making and problem solving. The students get an opportunity to get an exposure of the functioning of sponsoring institutions and societal problems, which enhances their perspective. These survey-based reports also serve the purpose of spreading the views and opinions of the academicians amongst the people at large.

Problems encountered:

Even though the students are given orientation on how to administer the questionnaire there is no direct control and supervision over their data collection method. As a result, every year, approximately three percent of the data collected has to be discarded due to incompletely and incorrectly filled information. The data are tested for reliability and extensive Statistical inferences are drawn by using the SPSS.



The data collection with the use of detailed questionnaire requires large stationary. In order to overcome this difficulty, the method of use of codification sheet for collecting information from many respondents with only one questionnaire per student is devised. It saves expenditure on stationary. The reports are submitted electronically to the sponsoring agencies.

Notes:

Any such project requires involvement of at least fifty to sixty students for a period of one month for data collection. It also requires detail orientation and briefing of the students not only for the administration of the questionnaire but also of the topic of study.

- 1. Department of Fine Arts is unique in the sense that it comes under UGC and not under AICT.
- 2. As it comes under UGC, the students get an opportunity to learn subject like environmental studies, English and regional language, along with Fine Art subjects.
- 3. Being practical-merited program, our department has five spacious labs for the students.
- 4. Our students get the privilege of updated library along with the e-books and journals. Departmental library with 524 books and 967 C.D.s, Cassettes and 623 Records (L.P.E.P) are available for students of Music as a special subject.
- 5. Department conducts study tours, site visit, workshops, demonstrations by eminent personalities which enrich their subject knowledge.

Weaknesses:

Opportunities:

35. SWOC analysis of the department and Future plans: Strengths:

• Students from any stream such as Arts, Commerce or even Home Science are eligible for pursuing this programme.

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- As the students come from various educational backgrounds, respective bridge courses on Mathematics and Accountancy are conducted to help them understand the subject better.
- Since the BCA programme is run under the Faculty of Technology, our students are eligible for MMCA under Science stream as well as MCA under Management. This gives dual benefit for their progression.
- The syllabus of this programme is updated every three years to bridge the gap between current demands of the industry and the coursework.
- Well qualified and experienced staff and well-equuipped computer laboratory is available.
- Since the BCA is a professional programme, it offers more career opportunities to the students over conventional programmes.
- The students get the advantage of placement cell run by the College as they meet most of the requirements of visiting recruiters.
- Our students are recruited in major companies like Wipro BPO, Infosys, etc. for the technical support

Weaknesses:

- The students' strength is declining every year.
- The staff is on purely temporary basis. Hence, the department faces a few problems in stabilizing and streamlining its procedures.
- The post graduation ie. MCA is not available in campus.

Opportunities:

- BCA programme can include live projects to be carried out by the students. This will help them to empower with intricacies of coding and problem solving.
- The department plans to develop tie-ups with the industry people to get their technical exposure for the students benefit.

Challenges:

- It is a challenge to meet the changing needs of the market. Keeping the students well-verse with recent trends is the challenge.
- It becomes a challenge to maintain the stability of the department with a temporary staff.

Future Plans:

- The College plans to regularize the teaching posts.
- The department will plan National seminar in future.
- Short term certificate courses in Ms Office, Tally, DTP, and Web Designing will be offered to the students from Junior and Senior wing.



B. Post-Accreditation Initiatives

The peer team had given following suggestions for improving the standards:

• Computerization of administration, evaluation and examination work:

The College has taken initiative in automation and computerization of administrative processes. On-line admission procedure has been started. Use of Tally package in account keeping has been initiated. Most of the examination formalities have been computerized. Examination registrations and admit cards of students, seating arrangement charts are generated automatically. Question papers are sent on-line and are printed at a secured place before examination. Preparation of internal and external mark sheets is computerized.

- Formal mechanism for utilizing the collected feedback from students on various aspects of their learning experience at the Departmental level may be initiated. The assessment of teachers' performance by students may be introduced on regular basis.

 Feedback from students is taken regularly. It is analyzed and the staff members are oriented to take necessary action by the Heads of the Departments. The feedback analysis is also a motivating tool for many teachers as they get a receipt of their efforts through a written feedback.
- Research and Consultancy by the teaching staff may be further encouraged by giving suitable incentives.

The College promotes research by motivating teachers to participate in seminars and conferences. The teachers get reimbursement of registration charges if they prepare and present their research papers in National or International seminars and conferences. A research Committee is formed and it guides the teachers to prepare proposals for minor, major and departmental or interdisciplinary research projects. It also encourages teachers to undertake M. Phil. and Ph. D. research studies. The College provides study leave under Faculty Improvement Programme of the UGC to facilitate and expedite the research work.

The teachers are also motivated to give consultancy in their specialized fields. Teachers in Department of Psychology have been providing psychological and career consultancy to the students of tenth and twelfth standards from different schools. Consultancy is



given for data collection and analysis to some organizations and industries.

• The College may further strengthen Alumni and Parent-Teacher Association.

The College has taken a step to make a formal Alumni Association and a Parent-Teacher Association by registering them with the Registrar of Cooperatives and the Registrar of Public Trust. The alumni are in constant contact with the College by participating in the annual exhibition of self made products in Campus. On the occasion of Maharshee Karve Birth Anniversary, a thought provoking lecture and a cultural programme is arranged for the alumni.

Meeting of parents and teachers are organised mostly at departmental levels. Sometimes special programmes are organised for the parents like lectures on self help group, disaster management and exhibition on career and employment opportunities after graduation etc.

 The College may establish linkages with local industries and companies so as to enrich students' progression and generation of additional resources.

The placement cell of the college has started organising short term workshops to enhance employability skills of the students and make them ready to satisfy the expectations of the industry. Hundred hours soft skills programme by Tata Consultancy Services, a employability skills development programme by Wipro and e-Clerk are organized for the students without any cost.

The College is thankful to the Peer Team for assessing the College and giving valuable suggestions for further improvement. The College assures that, with the positive attitude and enthusiasm, we are preparing us to fulfill the expectations about quality enrichment, through constant efforts and introducing innovative methods.

Section 1: Introduction

The S.N.D.T. Arts and Commerce College for Women, Karve Road, Pune, is one of the oldest colleges in India, established in 1916, by Bharatratna Maharshi Dhondo Kehsav Karve. The college was established with a view to imparting education to women and enabling them to stand on their own besides being good citizens. "Empowerment of women through education " is the mission of the college and the motto of the University, Sanskruta Stree parashakthi, meaning " an enlightened woman is the source of strength", is the philosophy behind the creation of this institution. The college is committed to the cause of women's empowerment by providing selected professional and vocational courses to meet the changing needs, with human values and purposeful social responsibility. In fact the S.N.D.T. Women's University has originated from this institution and got shifted to Mumbai during the year 1936. Until 1989, the college had been offering the postgraduate courses which were later taken over by the University and shifted to an independent PG college, in the same premises.

After eight decade long devotion to the cause of higher education, this college volunteered to be assessed by the NAAC and conducted the preliminary self study in the year 2003 and the same was submitted to NAAC in 2003. A three member Peer team constituted by NAAC with Prof. Azfal Mohammed, Former Vice-Chancellor of



Dr.B.R.Ambedkar Open University, Hyderabad, Andhra Pradesh, as Chairman, Prof. Mayank Dholakia, Dean- Faculty of Management, Head Department of Management, M. S. University of Baroda, Vadodara, as Member and Prof. A. Balasubramanian, Director, Centre for Information Science and Technology (CIST), University of Mysore, Mysore, as Member-Convenor, visited the college for two days during February 11-12, 2004.

This is a constituent college of the S.N.D.T.Women's University, spread over an area of 22 acres, in the city of Pune. It provides instructions to the students of three-year integrated B.A., B.Com and B.C.A., courses. This college also offers two enrichment courses. The medium of instruction is mainly Marathi, while B.Com and B.C.A courses are offered through English Medium also. The present student strength is 1091. The college has 22 teaching staff (21 permanent and 1 temporary), 22 teachers on clock hourly basis, and 18 non-teaching staff (14 administrative and 04 technical) at present. The unit cost of education is around Rs. 7,510 for B.A & B.Com., and Rs. 9,403 for B.C.A. courses.

Prior to the visit, the Peer Team has carefully gone through the self-study report submitted by the college and has made a detailed analysis of the facts and figures. During its visit, the Team went through all the relevant documents, visited all the Departments of the college, perused the facilities available and interacted with the members of the various committees. The academic, co-curricular, extra-curricular, sports and extension facilities were reviewed. The Peer Team also interacted with the Principal, Teaching and non-Teaching staff, Students, Parents and Alumni. Based on the above exercise, and keeping in mind the criteria identified by NAAC, the Peer Team has taken the value judgment. The assessment of the college under various criteria, the commendable features, as well as the issues of concern are given below.





Section 2: Criterion -wise Analysis Criterion 1:- Curricular Aspects

As a constituent College of S. N. D. T. Women's University, Mumbai, the college presently offers only UG courses under Arts and Commerce faculties. The goals and objectives of the institution are clearly stated, periodically reviewed, and communicated systematically to all its constituencies. The programmes of teaching and learning are consistent with the goals and objectives of the institution. Feedback from academic peers and employers is used in the initiation, review and redesign of programmes.

The college follows annual system of teaching. The S.N.D.T Women's University designs the courses from time to time. Some senior staff members of the college participate in designing and reviewing of the syllabus and course material. The mission of the college is reflected in the curricula. In order to empower the girl students, vocational courses like office management and computer applications are being offered. The curriculum has been enriched by adding some special papers in the existing programmes. In addition to these, remedial coaching is also being offered to the identified students.

The college is seen by the local community as an intellectual and educational centre for girls in this city, with various programmes that benefit the student community. A few teachers have participated in preparing the course material for media programme of EMRC, Pune. Thrust has also been given to encourage additional curricular inputs through periodicals, magazines, newspapers and other reading material.

Criterion -II: Teaching - Learning and Evaluation

The institution claims to have transparent admission process. The institution facilitates the effective running of the teaching-learning programmes. There is a well-conceived plan for monitoring student progress. The institution also has adopted the

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University's existing mechanism to recruit qualified faculty. The institution has an open and participative mechanism for evaluation of teaching, and work satisfaction of the faculty. The faculties have opportunities for continued academic progress and professional advancement.

Admission of students to the various courses of study is based on their academic record. The college follows the reservation policies of the Govt. in admitting students to a particular course. For subjects like, Economics, English, Mathematics and Statistics, remedial courses are offered to academically backward and weak students to improve their performance. The college encourages continuous assessment of learners. The students' performance is monitored regularly by conducting totally six internal tests in a year.

There is a provision for awarding prizes and certificates for meritorious students. Academically brilliant students are encouraged to participate in literary, cultural and debating competitions conducted at local levels.

Teachers have started preparing annual teaching plans at the beginning of the academic year to enable students to organize their academic schedules. This practice has to be formalized and pursued.

The UG teaching schedule is unitized according to annual system. The same is monitored at the Departmental meetings and provision is also made for obtaining a feed back from the students. The college has introduced a practice of supplementing regular lectures with media programmes, class seminars, quiz competitions, group discussion, teaching through LCD, OHP and charts, etc.

The Peer Team has noticed that a few members of teaching staff have devoted their time to prepare some audio-visual cassettes. The students are informed in advance about the formal and informal methods of evaluation by the individual departments. The curricular and co-curricular activities introduced by the college help to monitor the

overall performance of the students. Teachers are encouraged to participate in orientation and refresher courses.

The college follows self-appraisal method of teachers. The appraisal reports are scrutinized by the Principal after the review is made by the individual department. The feed back has been used to adopt suggestive and corrective measures.

The college adopts annual system of examinations. It had 238 working days and 188 teaching days during 2002-2003. Permanent teaching and non-teaching staff are appointed by the University. In the case of vacancies, the college is authorized to appoint temporary teaching and non-teaching staff on contract basis. Temporary appointments are made by the selection committee, as per the guidelines of the University.

Criterion-III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

Being an Undergraduate college, the main thrust is on teaching. However, many teachers have good research background and they are guiding students for Ph.D and M.Phil. The college encourages its teachers to carry out research projects and publications.

The college extends full support to its teachers to do their M.Phil / Ph.D. So far, eleven teachers have acquired Ph.D., 3 have M.Phil. and the remaining have P.G degrees. There is a Distance Education Sub Centre of the University within the campus and some teachers are associated with those programmes also. This facilitates not only the drop-outs but also the employed women to pursue further studies.

The college has been conducting several extension activities like community development, social work, health and hygiene awareness, adult education and literacy, blood donation camp, AIDS and environmental awareness camps, etc. In addition, students and staff have participated in the activities like personality development

programmes and wall magazine, etc. This college has three NSS units and the volunteers have taken up the programmes like population education, adult education, National literacy Mission and other related activities. Students and staff are motivated to participate in extension activities.

This college works and plans with G.Os and N.G.Os for extension activities. The Peer Team has noticed the absence of formal Extension Cell and feels it desirable to set up a regular cell to promote outreach and extension activities.

Criterion- IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has a serene atmosphere with adequate built-up space. It provides computer and library facilities on a sharing basis. The college has proper Internet Facility and an adequate lab for Computer training. It also has adequate physical facilities and is being expanded to run all its educational programmes and administrative activities. The college enables optimum use of the available infrastructure by the students. The funds needed for these activities are met through University grants, specific donations and from the income of self-financing courses. This college has a vast campus which needs to be maintained by students and regular employees appointed for this.

The college Library is shared by four institutions and functions as a common facility. It has 72,592 books. It subscribes 185 magazines / periodicals. In addition to these, they have a small collection of audio and video cassettes. The Peer team is of the opinion that a college of this size should have a Library of their own to cater to the needs of the Staff and students satisfactorily. This college has a central computer facility with 40 PCs and works from 9.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. on all working days. However, this facility is also shared by the Junior College in the forenoon.

The college provides certain basic facilities needed for sports with limited infrastructure and equipment. Out door facilities like Volleyball, Ball-badminton, Football, Basketball, Kabaddi, and a few Indoor games are available. Some students



have also achieved international recognition on their own and without any support from the college. Unfortunately, there is no full-time Physical Director to coach the students.

Outstanding sports persons are given certificates and cash awards. Health checkup facilities are provided for students and teaching staff. The University has provided the common Hostel facilities at the campus which are shared by four institutions, including this College.

Criterion -V: Student Support and Progression

The college publishes its prospectus every year, with details about the Historical background of the college, the courses offered, combination of subjects, medium of the courses, disability criterion and various sources of financial assistance to students. Admission of students is effected as per university guidelines. Ninety percent of students appear for qualifying examination and the drop-out rate is around 10%. Only about 30% of the students go for higher studies. Many of the students have occupied prominent positions in administration, bank services, politics, teaching and University administration. Informal coaching and training is given to needy students of this college for their preparation for various competitive examinations and other professional/technical examinations.

Faculty members of this college guide and counsel the students in academic and personal matters. The students are guided through a Study Circle set up by students themselves. The alumni association, which was in existence earlier, has now been revived and it plans to extend support for the overall development of this college. It also conducts health camps in the college for the benefit of students.

A number of students of the college obtain financial aid through different types of scholarships. About 50 to 60 freshers get welfare scholarships every year.

Indoor and outdoor games, debate clubs, audio and video facilities, student magazine, essay writing, elocution and cultural programmes provide the recreational avenues to the students. There are other facilities also which provide all-round





development of the students. Annual sports and cultural events are held regularly and prizes are awarded to winners.

Criterion -VI: Organisation and Management

The college has a reasonably good coordination and monitoring mechanism through various committees which help for smooth functioning of academic and administrative activities. Some of the Committees are: Purchase Committee, Admission Committee and Examination Committee. The academic calendar is framed by the college. The college forms a Committee at the beginning of the year to ensure effective implementation of the academic programmes and to review the academic calendar. The cultural and social activities and the opportunities for participation in extension programmes seem to help the college in evolving itself into a well-balanced institution of learning. The budget of the college is based on the University's grant, and fee from students.

Criterion- VII: Healthy Practices

The Peer Team identified the following features, which may enhance academic status of the college:

- Adherence to Academic Plans prepared in advance which enable to improve the academic standards of the college.
- The college supplements regular teaching by providing Audio-Video aids to make teaching more effective.
- The Strategic plan of the college in regard to time-table, annual academic and action plans, tests, performance indicators, etc.
- The collective decision making and team work.
- Encouragement given to students to participate in competitions organized by different institutions and organizations of the State as well as the University.
- The motivation to participate in co-curricular and extra curricular activities which adds value to education.

 Good Teacher-student interaction which is an important factor to improve the quality of education.

Section 3: - Overall Analysis

The Peer Team after going through the self-study report submitted by the college and after its visits to various academic and physical facilities, is generally satisfied by the progress of the college in fulfilling its aims and objectives of providing higher education to girl students. The college has earned the reputation of a lead college for imparting need-based education. The Peer Team has made note of a few unique features of this college. The Peer Team would like to express its concern on the following:

- Sharing of facilities like Library, Hostel, Computer laboratory, with the Junior College and other colleges of the University in the Campus, is not in the best interest of the college.
- The Choice of subjects is limited to two faculties only, which deprives the students from a wider range of subjects of their choice
- · The college is yet to prepare a Perspective Plan for the future development.
- The faculty members should be encouraged to participate in academic conferences, seminars and workshops by official sponsorship.

Keeping in view that it is a constituent college of the S.N.D.T Women's University, the Peer Team would suggest the following for improving the standards:

- Computerization of Administration, Evaluation and Examination work may be taken
 up at the earliest.
- Formal mechanism for utilizing the collected feedback from students on various aspects of their learning experience at the departmental level may be initiated.
- The assessment of teachers' performance by students may be introduced on regular
- Research and Consultancy by the teaching staff may be further encouraged by giving suitable incentives
- The college may further strengthen Alumni and the Parent-Teacher Associations.



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 The college may establish linkages with local industries and companies so as to enrich students progression and generation of additional resources.

The Peer Team would like to thank the University authorities, Principal, Teaching and non-teaching staff, Students, Alumni and Parents for the co-operation extended by them to the team in the successful completion of this exercise of Assessment of the college.




